Rockingham students choose from 70 degrees (associate degrees in applied sciences) or certificates and diploma programs each year. The AAS bachelor's degree program in criminal justice technology requires a completion of 64 hours, plus a 16-week spring internship with local law enforcement/criminal justice organization. There is also an undergraduate 18-credit CJ certificate program at Community College. Southwest Community College southwestern community college was founded in 1964 to serve residents of Mukun, Jackson and Swain counties. In 2009, enrollment increased with the opening of Jerry Ston's Public Safety Training Complex Mcon to host programs on law enforcement, EMS, and fire/rescue. The college also hosts the North Carolina Arrest Officer Certification Course (DOCC), which prepares candidates for arrest certification at entry level levels. There is not much difference between curricula from school to school. Therefore, find a school where they are comfortable with the environment. I think what makes each program unique is what brings the faculty to the table in terms of their research expertise. Our faculty specializes in denouncing, theory, law enforcement, court, reform, etc. In addition, our curriculum has a specialty focus area in crime analysis that essentially uses data to answer researchable questions in criminal justice and criminology. I don't think student schools are ready to work specifically in North Carolina. Rather, schools prepare students to work wherever they may live. I would tell them to take a course or two and identify if they enjoyed the material and could foresee working in the criminal justice system. Good candidates are those people who want to work with people and make a difference in those people's lives.
