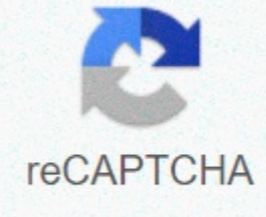

They must: take the courses at CSU, Dominguez Hills or submit a verification of the current equivalent course registration to another accredited institution; andGo courses that begin in the first semester of enrollment and each semester thereafter until they pass all rehabilitation courses?\*If all development courses have not passed within two semesters, students may not be able to enroll or continue to attend courses at CSU, Dominguez Hills.All students subject to degree requirements in 1979-80 and subsequent lists must demonstrate ability in writing skills as a prerequisite for graduation. Students will have to meet GWAR until they complete 72 credits. GWAR can be met through one of the following options: Postgraduate Writing Examinations (GWE), a voluntary test for which a fee is charged, is available several times per academic year. Students must earn a score of 8 or higher (on a 12-point scale) to pass the GWE. Students are allowed to receive the GWE twice. Students who have not received 8 or higher after taking the test twice must take a certification course. General Education Certification Banned community colleges and public four-year colleges may sanction (certify) that all or part of the general education (after 1980), have been fulfilled. Academic Skills Requirements for Undergraduate StudentsCanaemic Skills Assessment Plan (ASAP) Students Admitted to CSUDH Fall 1998 and AfterNew students enrolled at the University in the fall of 1998 onwards, are subject to a system throughout the placement test and corrective English and math class requirements (E.O. 665). Non-exempt students must take the English Placement Test (EPT) and the Entry Level Mathematics (ELM) exam before enrolling in the courses. If the test results indicate that corrective courses in English or mathematics are required, students must: enroll in the required remedial classes in the first semester of study and thereafter. Pass all rehabilitation courses in two semesters. After two semesters, students cannot enroll or continue to attend courses at CSU, Dominguez Hills, unless all required rehabilitation classes have passed (ENG 88/ENG 99 and MAT 3/MAT 9). In addition, students are subject to an academic skills assessment program (ASAP) test if they do not pass general education level English (ENG 110 and ENG 111) and mathematics (MAT 105 or equivalent) in four semesters. Finally, students are subject to asap exclusion from the University if they do not pass General Education level English (ENG 110 and ENG 111) and mathematics (MAT 105 or equivalent) in four semesters. Students admitted to CSUDH before autumn 1998Studs who have been discharged and enrolled before autumn 1998 are subject to guidelines of the Academic Skills Assessment Plan (ASAP) for the completion of the English Placement Test (EPT), the Participation Level (ELM) exam, required corrective English and math courses, and general level education English and math courses. Students are subject to an ASAP test if they do not receive the EPT and ELM and pass all required corrective English courses (ENG 88 and ENG 99) and math courses (MAT 3 and MAT 9) within two semesters. Students can be excluded from the University if they do not meet these requirements and courses in four semesters. In addition, students are subject to asap assay unless they pass general level education classes in English (ENG 110 and ENG 111) and math (MAT 105 or equivalent) in four semesters. Students can be excluded from the University if they do not pass their General Education level courses in six semesters. Students should contact the University Advice Center for additional information at (310) 243-3538, email at uac@csudh.edu, or in person at WH A-220.Completion of Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement (GWAR): California State University Executive Order 665 states that all students must demonstrate skills in writing skills at the upper division level as a condition for graduation. It also states that certification of writing ability should be made available to students as they enter their junior year [60 points]. Students must complete the requirement before their senior year [90 points]. Undergraduate students must first complete their lower-level English composition courses in Area A, General Education, before trying to complete this higher class requirement. GWAR should be fulfilled at the beginning of the junior year (or 60 points), and satisfied once the 72 units are completed. GWAR can be satisfied through one of the following options: Students must satisfy GWAR once they complete 72 units. The GWAR can be met through one of the following options: Postgraduate Writing Examinations (GWE)The Postgraduate Writing Examinations (GWE), a voluntary test for which a \$35 fee is charged, is available to students five times per semester in September, November, February, April and June or July. Students must earn a score of 8 or higher to meet GWAR. Students can take the test a second time if necessary. The test can only be carried out twice. After two attempts at the test, students must then take a certification course. Information on test dates and registration procedures is available in the course schedule of each semester, at the Testing Centre, Northern Library 5705, (310) 243-3909, testing@csudh.edu, or at tests for students who specialize in distance learning programs and other off-campus programs. Although students majoring in these programs can receive the GWE on campus, most students are allowed to take it through a proctor in their place There are three off-campus administrations per academic year, in the fall, spring and summer. Students who make this choice must register directly with the Program Advisors, who will then provide them with all necessary information and material. Provision is made for students who are not native English speakers. The GWE registration form asks students to indicate whether or not they are native English speakers. Students who declare themselves non-native speakers can choose to write their essay in two hours instead of one, although this option must be made at the time of registration. Essays are graded together with those of native speakers in relation to overall estimates of focus, critical understanding, content, organization, and grammar. Provisions are laid down for students with special needs. The arrangements are made on an individual basis by the Student DisAbility Resource Center, Welch Hall 180, (310) 243-3660, in conjunction with the Testing Center. Students must contact the Student DisAbility Resource Centre at least 10 working days before the GWE test date and after enrolling in the GWE. Students should contact the Examination Centre for details: (31) 243-3909, or testing@csudh.edu.Certifying Composition Courses offered by the English Department. The English Department offers regular advanced composition courses (ENG 350, 3 units, A-C/NC). A Composition Collaborative exam (a timed writing test similar to GWE) is administered at the end of the course and counts for 25% of the grade. Students must earn a C grade or higher (B or higher for postgraduate students) to meet GWAR. Higher Department writing Supplement offered by the Department of Interdisciplinary Studies. The Writing Supplement (IDS 397, 2 units, and IDS 398, 2 units, CR/NC), provides personalized teaching in composition that is complementary to writing for other courses. Students must complete both IDS 397 and IDS 398. A synthesis collaboration test (a timed writing test similar to GEW) is administered at the end of IDS 398 and counts for 50% of the grade. Students must earn credit in both IDS 397 and IDS 398 to satisfy the GWAR. Transfer C certificationsThe who have met the graduation writing assessment requirement (GWAR) at another CSU campus in 1984 or later, but before enrolling in the CSU, Dominguez Hills, can apply to meet the GWAR at CSUDH. Students must complete a report on GWAR's fulfillment at the Examination Centre by attaching a copy of the certification test score or a copy of an official and the description of a list of the relevant courses. Even if students can double certain general education courses, they will not receive the additional credits to graduation with the double count.
