Pearson makes some of its training materials, such as this course, available in a more homeschool friendly format. The course consists of four parts: a hardcover student and teacher book and a softcover Basic Magazine questions and an E'J key answer. The basic questions of the magazine is the first clue that it is more than to read and repeat the course. For each unit, and for each chapter in the book, the lead question provides the focus for this section of the book. Some of E'J looks like a typical book with filling in blank questions, but there are also opinion issues that require research and essay writing. The answers to questions about the facts are presented in the key to answering E'J's questions. Another piece of advice that more than memorization is expected to come in front of the student book. After an initial 23 pages showing the constitution, the next 30-page section focuses on writing skills such as storytelling and narrative writing, research, persuasion and evaluation of writing, and critical thinking skills such as cause and effect, problem solving, notes, and data analysis. These skills are believed to have been studied earlier; this section is only a reminder of the application of these skills in this course. Although the text of the Constitution is closer to the beginning of the book, the author takes some time to get to what he says. The first four chapters are logically focused on the principles of government and how the American government happened. After that, however, the author disconnects in 5 chapters, discussing political parties, voters, the electoral process, the media and public opinion, as well as interest groups. I think the student may be better served, waiting to cover these chapters until later in the course. Group 3 returns to meat, debating the legislature in three chapters. The Executive Review takes 5 chapters, while the judiciary receives 4 chapters. that 2 chapters about comparative political systems and comparative economic systems come before the two chapters about state and local government again, I would wait for unit until the student saw a large picture of federal, state and local government before comparing other systems. Chapters are about 30 pages long and divided into three or four sections. Each section starts with its own guiding question. The dictionary words are listed in the box so that the student can search for words in the included glossary. Other words are emphasized in the text and are defined in a field on the same page. Color and buve photos and graphics adorn the pages. The level of text reading seems about the average for high school textbooks. Each section ends with several evaluation questions (answers where appropriate in the teacher's book) and a short written assignment. There did not appear to be any correlation between chapters and assignments on major issues; use them when you think it's most appropriate, perhaps later in the study chapter. Revised in 2013, the teacher's book includes a smaller full-color copy of the student book, with the same page numbers for easy reference. Background information, training suggestions and ideas for discussion are included in the fields; some of these take partners or small groups, so not all are appropriate for homeschool installation. While the answers to the assessment questions in the student book are included here, there are also links to online resources, including all in one resource that are not available to homeschool parents. Without access to them, you are on your own for testing. New to the 2013 edition are CC literacy standards, differentiated learning and one-semester and one-year offers that provide an extra layer of flexibility to meet your needs. Since this course is from a secular publisher, I did not expect much about the influence of Christianity on the nation's founding, and little is present. Unalienable rights are simply considered inviolable, without explanation. However, the author does a decent job of depicting the core ideals that have shaped the new government, such as limited government. Overall, I believe it's worth the course, especially if you want one that challenges students to study external sources and indulge their writing ability. Ability.

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
