As of 2010, it had a population of 45,248. [2] The county town is Coldwater. [3] As one of the government districts, he was named after U.S. Secretary of the Navy John Branch under President Andrew Jackson. [1] The region was founded in 1829 and was organized in 1833. Branch County consists of Coldwater, MI Micropolitan statistical area. History Branch County was a settlement in New England. The original founders of Coldwater were settlers from the northern coastal colonies – Yankees, descendants of English puritans who came from the Old World in 1600 and who brought their culture. During the early 1800s, there was a wave of New England farmers who headed west into what was then an indomable Northwest territory. Many traveled across the state of New York via the Erie Canal; The threat of Native Americans was reduced by the end of the Black Hawk War. These first settlers unloaded farms, built government buildings, and introduced postal routes. They brought a passion for education and founded many schools. Many were supporters of abolitionism. They were mostly members of the congregational church, although some were Episcopal. Culturally Branch County, like much of Michigan, developed as part of the Northern Layer, continuous with New England culture, during its early history. [4] [5] The region still depends on agriculture as the basis for its economy. Geography According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the county has a total area of 520 square miles (1,300 square miles (1,310 square miles (1,310 square miles (34 square miles)) is land and 13 square miles (34 square miles) (2.6%) is water. [6] It is the third smallest district in Michigan by total area. Adjacent Kalamazoo County - Northwest Calhoun County - Northern Hillsdale County, Indiana - Southern LaGrange County, Indiana - Southwest St. Joseph County - Western Main Highway I-69 - runs north-south through central Branch County. It runs east of Girard, Coldwater and Kinterhooku. BL I-69 – passes through Coldwater. US 12 - runs the ENE through the central branches of the County. He misses Bronson, Coldwater and Quincy. M-60 - in progress part of the district. Enters near Union City; runs west 5 miles (8 km) to the junction with the M60, south of Athens. M-66 - passes nw tip of the county. It enters west of Leonidas, Michigan, running east 2.4 miles (4 km), turning north toward Athens, Michigan. M-86 runs east-west through central Branch County. It enters from Colon, Michigan, running east to the intersection with US12, three miles (5 km) west of Coldwater. This drop of -539 people from the 2000 Census in the United States represents a -1.2% drop in growth over the decades. In 2010, there were 16,419 households and 11,350 families in the region. The population density was 89.4 per square mile (34.5 km2). There were 20,841 residential units with an average density of 41.2 per square mile (15.9 square kilometers). The racial and ethnic composition of the county was 90.9% White, 3.0% Black or African American, 0.4% Native American, 0.4% Asian, 4.0% Hispanic or Latino, 0.1% of other races, and 1.2% of two or more races. There were 16,419 households, of which 31.5% had children under the age of 18, 52.2% were spouses, 11.1% had a household without a spouse, 30.9% were individuals. The average household size was 2.56 and the average family size was 3.05. In the county, the population was spread out, with 23.9% under 18, 8.0% from 18 to 24, 25.0% from 25 to 44, 28.3% from 45 to 64, and 14.7% who were 65 years or older. The median age was 40 years. For every 100 women there were 111.4 men. For every 100 women aged 18 and over, there were 112.9 men. A 3-year estimate from the 2010 American Community Survey[12] suggests that the median household income in the county was \$41,855 and the median family income was \$48,959. Men had a median income of \$25,595 versus \$17,263 for women. Per capita income for the county was \$18,289. About 2.5% of families and 17.7% of the population were below the poverty line, including 25.3% of those under the age of 18 and 9.0% of over-65s. Since 1884, the Republican Party nominee has carried 85% of the vote (29 out of 34).
