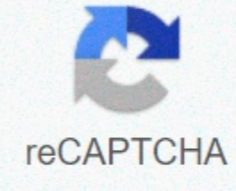

The best bike racks for cars Allen Sports has design and manufacturing bike racks for more than 50 years since Dick Allen founded the company in his garage. The first scaffolding he designed was made of an electric pipe and an old fire hose, but the company has since moved on to more modern materials. This product is simply full of excellent design features, but its most impressive element is ease of use. It attaches to the trailer towing hitch (you need a 2-inch fastening, although it's quite standard), you stand in the upright position of the device and fasten it with a simple but sturdy bolt. That's all, and you're ready to go. The carrying arms are 22 inches long, so they fit even larger wheel frames, and they fold out of the way when not in use. Allen Sports' patented binding system is very easy to use, while anti-swings are also included to prevent the wheel from swinging while driving. The structure is sturdy steel with a black powder jacket finish for a product with a long service life and even has a lifetime warranty. This is a very well designed, very well built bicycle rack from a company you can trust. It should also be noted that you get state-of-the-art design and construction for a large model with space for 4 bikes and a decent price tag. It is simply a phenomenal value. Saris is one of the premium manufacturers of bicycle racks for cars, and it's no surprise that it has found its way to our list. It is known for its state-of-the-art design for scaffolding, and this frame-mounted model is in line with the brand's pedigree. Easy to install, adjust and charge, this bike rack is designed with ease of use as one of its most important features. Largely plastic structure keeps weight low weighs barely 10 kilograms in total), while the intelligent injection molding structure keeps the boson rigid and –much stronger than you would expect from a plastic rack. That's pretty good value considering the quality materials and design – although you'll find cheaper rear-mounted racks elsewhere if your budget is very tight. Also, don't forget that this model only has room to charge two wheels, and there are options with a little more space if you need it. However, this is still a very well-designed rack, which is one of the best manufacturers on the market. Another brand with excellent pedigree, cycling enthusiasts have long recognized Thule Bike Rack as a solid investment. Note the use of the word investment – no longer by accident. The product has an eye-watering price tag. That makes it easily the most expensive car bike rack on the list. With that money, you'll get an insanely well-designed bike. It has a very easy, toolless attachment to a 1.25 or 2-inch hook. Once attached, the highly intelligent hinge joint either leans outwards to allow wheeled access to the frame, or allows the entire stand to fold up and out of the road empty. Styles like this installed on the frame tend to be easier to load than roof rack versions; However, this model takes this easy to a whole new level. The wheels simply settle about a foot off the ground with well-designed ratchet arms that easily lock them in place. It even has an integrated cable lock to lock the wheels on the rack for increased safety. In conclusion, however, yes, this is not a cheap option. In fact, it is the exact opposite. But the Thule bike rack is still a solid, long-term investment that is well designed, well built and simply full of very useful features. If you like the look on Thule Bike Carrier's face but hinted at the price tag, this Swagman bike rack might be worth a look. It's basically a much simpler version with a much lower price tag. On the other hand, this model lacks a lot of top-notch features that you can find in other models. There is no hinge that allows the trunk to enter; it does not fold by itself to facilitate storage. The locking cable is available to lock the wheels safely, but it is sold separately. On the other hand, it's very easy to use with ratchet arms that lock the bike safely during transportation and are very easy to use – they also have quite a wide loading area and can hold frames up to 59 cm. Their load capacity is also good, up to 35 kilograms per bike, which should be more than abundant for the majority of bike types. The price point (depending on the carrier capacity of the model) is towards a more expensive end to the market, but it is still much smaller than some other models. Our second product from Allen Sports to compile the list, this is a remarkably flexible design. Although the last few models examined in the list are built to be mounted on the mounting bars, this model is designed to be mounted on vehicles without attachment. In addition, it has a very smart design that makes it suitable for a wide range of vehicles, including everything from sedans and hatchbacks to mini-cars. This is even a great bike rack for SUVs. Installation is safe and secure with well-set and easy-to-use belt systems, and at every point where the rack rests on top of the car body, you will find durable cushions to protect the paint of the vehicle. Your bike will be loaded into individual binding points that lock into the top tube so that the wheels are securely in place during transport. It is also worth noting that there are different sizes available with racks suitable for 2, 3 or 4 wheels. This is a very well designed rack from a very reputable company that really cares about its products and has produced a great product at a really low price. Here is another Thule bike rack and another high quality product from a respected manufacturer. This model differs slightly from the previous Thule model, which we looked at in the fact that the wheel is of a type whose wheel is connected through the top bar rather than the wheels. This makes it a little less complicated in its design than we saw in another model, so the price of this Thule bike rack is quite a bit lower. This lower price leads slightly to the features included in the trade-in. Padded anchorages If you select a roller that holds the wheel through the top tube, keep an eye on the filling of the anchorages as well. This can really help protect your painting when you lock the bike in place. Anti-Sway Cages There are a few different ways scaffolding can be designed to minimize swinging, but the wobble cage is most commonly used. In particular, you can find these in scaffolding patterns that hold the top tube, but rear-mounted models that lock the wheels can also benefit from built-in anti-sway technology. Basically, it just helps keep the bike stable while riding on the rack. The advantage of this is that the wheels must not affect the handling of the vehicle (especially at road speeds) and also prevent the wheels from denting each other. On the negative side, because they lack a really solid attachment point, they are not as safe, and you need to make sure that you attach them correctly before charging the wheels. Upright roof rack As the name suggests, this type of rack keeps the bike upright. This is a very safe and safe way to ride a bike. The downside is that the roof rack itself can negatively affect fuel performance, although you can compensate a lot for it by choosing the best roof rack. Charging these types of racks can also be more difficult, especially with taller cars or heavier wheels.
