There is also a huge community of developers and artists who have created a wide range of add-ons, making it a highly customizable program. If you want a specific feature, there's probably an add-on. The interface is highly customizable, so you can analyze things back or leverage multiple windows and toolbars if necessary. For this reason GIMP has a similar steep learning curve as Photoshop, but when you made your way through a few tutorials, it's quite handy. In our experience, gimp was a little less responsive and used a little more resources than its proprietary counterpart, but this can easily be forgiven on the grounds that GIMP has always been and will always be a free and open source. With Photoshop CS5, simple editing tweaks allow you to combine two pictures together without losing or integrity. You can then perform tricks, such as removing backgrounds and clipping images, giving you the final product you'll have floating. Start Photoshop CS5, then open the bubble image and picture to go inside it. If two graphics are in the same location, hold down Ctrl and select each to open them at the same time. Note that images open on separate tabs in the CS5 workspace. Click the picture to enable its tab and then click Select All. Flashing dotted line or marching ants surround the image.
