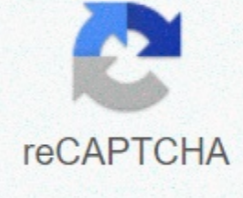

The eastern part of DuPage County is Wayne Township, while the western part of Kane County is St. Charles Township. At the time of the 2010 census, the population was 2,431. [3] and 2,425 as population estimates for 2018. [4] At the end of the 19th and early 20th centuries, Wayne was a prominent centre for research on horse breeding and farming. Since World War II Wayne has steadily grown, adding units near Illinois route 59, to Munger Road, near Smith Road, near Dunham Castle on Army Trail Road, along Powis Road, and filling up around the village. For work, residents are primarily commuters to Chicago through train stations in Geneva, Bartlett, or Western Chicago or drive to Chicago or other suburbs, especially Kane, DuPage, Lake, Cook, or McHenry County. In October 2007, the historic Chicago and Northwest Rail Station was moved from Dunham Castle to Chicago and the Northwest Rail (now Union Pacific) tracks along the Army Runway. The station was originally located, but moved to Dunham Castle between 1940 and 1950; the old station was converted into a horse. Dunham Castle owners' grants and contributions have moved the station location and is currently being restored. This building is called Depp on site. Additional railway buildings were moved to private property in the village, including one station building about 1/2 mile west of Munger Road on Army Trail Road. Oaklawn Farm and Dunham Castle dunham castle, November 2006 during the Stirrup Cup Celebration. Wayne's main landmark is Dunham Castle, originally built between 1878 and 1882. The stone structure, full of turrets, was inspired by Norman Castle and built by one of Wayne's first pioneers, Mark Dunham, a Percheron horse breeder. Helping Mark design was architect Smith Hoag of Elgin, Illinois. [6] Mark Dunham's horse farm Oaklawn Farm, founded in Wayne in 1866, was one of the first percheron breeding farms in the US; Dunham is known as Father Percheron in North America. During the 1893 World Columbia Exposition, a train from Chicago to Wayne brought guests to see percheron horses on a 2,000-acre (8.1 km2) farm. Those who made the trip included Cyrus McCormick, George Pullman, and The Duke of Veragua. At the height of the Percheron business, Dunham built a house now called Dunham Castle, near the farm, on the north-west corner of the Army Runway road and Dunham Road. Dunhams based the idea on the design of its new home to the French chateaux. The building, brick, and stone, with multi-colored slate roofs, stands surrounded by forests, gardens, and gently sloping lawns. The interior features parquet floors, statues, tapestries and copies of fine French artwork. In 1899, Wirth Dunham inherited Dunham Castle. He died in 1931. Dunham Castle has been converted into four spacious apartments. No interior changes were made that affected the structure. Between 1953 and 1976 there were several owners. In 1976, the castle was sold to the Griffins family, which looked to make the house a museum, a professional office or a private catering club. In 1976, the house was sold. The castle was rarely open to public excursions and charitable foundation depositors. [7] [8] The house is again owned by private individuals, which were sold in October 2013, and in early 2016 began a large-scale renovation of the private owner, which is expected to be completed in 2020. However, demand for Percheron horses has steadily declined as gas-powered cars, trucks and farm implements have grown in popularity, eventually percherons have become a novel or parade horse, and Oaklawn Farm has ceased its commercial business. Dunham Farm Offices, then popularly known as Inn, is well preserved, now home to Wayne's only dining institution and social club, Dunham Woods Club. Dunham Woods Equestrian Club Dunham Woods Equestrian Club was founded in 1934. Wayne and a group of Geneva residents who rented the original Dunham family home. The fire destroyed the original old bus house in the 1950s, and the income from the insurance club used the inn, Lower Barn, the swimming pool, tennis courts and surrounding land. The Gray Room banquet hall, formal dining room and new kitchen were added in 1957. In 1961, Wayne-DuPage Hunt helped acquire more land from Dunham's Inc., including kennels and a high barn. This purchase was made on behalf of dunham woods equestrian club. Additional land was purchased in 1975, which included outdoor equestrian rings, an indoor equestrian ring, a cross-country course, a tenant's house and a new pile barn rented by the club for hunting. In 1979, four corners were adopted into the National Register of Historic Places, consisting of the intersection of the Army Trail and Dunham Road, dunham woods equestrian club and Dunham Castle, as well as the addition of surrounding land and outbuildings. Dunham Woods Equestrian Club (Main Entrance), February, 2011. Army Trail Road on Dunham Road, on the south-east corner of Dunham Woods Equestrian Club is an active social and tennis club, with three dining rooms, two separate rooms, a terrace, and a patio. The club hosts various social events and private parties and is open from February to December. The members of the club are primarily the residents of Wayne, as well as residents from neighboring communities such as St. Charles and Geneva. The equestrian tradition of Wayne Village is committed to preserving its equestrian nature and reputation. The village has miles of equestrian trails, as well as dozens of horse farms, equestrian centers and boarding stables. Wayne-DuPage Hunt, founded in 1920, is one of two fox hunting groups to continue hunting through metro Chicago, the other being the Mill Creek Hunt in far north Wadsworth. Wayne-DuPage is a drag hunt, not chasing live foxes. The hunt includes kennels of about 60 fox hounds and a membership list of 150, although 80 drivers have good turnout on a crisp fall weekend. Traditions such as stirrup cup, rye or brandy, served at the beginning, and hunting breakfast, snacks served at the end, were preserved. The Wayne-DuPage Hunt Pony Club is a related organisation that teaches young people to ride, train and take care of horses. Housing in the village of Wayne is different from small bungalows to multimillion-dollar estates. In the village there are several units, the size and value of the house are more or less the same for a certain subsection. Most units have one to 3 acres (12,000 m2) zoning. Most of the modern housing has been built since the 1970's. Some rural houses date back to the late 19th century. DuPage County, at least 2 acres for the storage of horses. This event is carried out by community organisations along with Wayne Village. In 2009, the event commemorated the 175th anniversary of Wayne's work. In addition, other events, somewhat similar to Wayne's Day, were held to raise funds for the Wayne Police Department, including the 2017 Wayne Wine and Horse Fest fundraising event, which attracted more than 1,200 people in the district and collected more than \$42,000 for the Wayne Police Department. [13] A subsequent Wayne Wine and Horse Fest was organised and collected additional funding for the Wayne Police Department. 1935-1936 Wayne lived with notable people Marguerite Henry, author George C. Marshall, future U.S. Army Chief of Staff, US Secretary of State, U.S. Secretary of Defense and Nobel Peace Prize laureate Joy Morton, founder of Morton Salt; Dunham Woods president in the 1930s. Located on the county's northwest corner, the preserve's 3,462 acres (14.01 km2) merge with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources land near the north to form a continuous 4,000-acre (16 km2) stretch of land, a limited resource for a growing urban area. Pratt's Wayne Woods in savannahs, swamps, meadows and swamps has many nature-friendly opportunities and recreational excursions. The canned Brewster Creek area is the site of the main wetland restoration program. The area now known as Pratt's Wayne Woods first formed in 1965 with a 160-acre (0.65 km2) donation to Illinois. Thanks to the efforts of George Pratt, the city superintendent and conservation commissioner during the 1960s and 1970s, the Forest Conservation District began buying the additional lands that make up Pratt's Wayne Woods today. The first private landowner in the area was Mark Wentworth Fletcher, an array of mathematics who made his living in Geneva, Dundee, Elgin, St Charles and Wayne. Fletcher purchased 320 acres (1.3 km2) from the federal government on February 18, 1846, and built a farmhouse along Dunham Road. After Fletcher's death in 1900, the land changed ownership several times until Mark Morton acquired it in 1926. One of the founders of Morton Salt Company, Morton dug up a farm in the south-west corner of the farm for sand and gravel. The land, which was not used in mineral operations, was cultivated for grain and maize until the death of Morton in 1951. The Palm family originally intended that their park be their place of retirement; but the state of Illinois had other plans. The state purchased the original 320 acres (1.3 km2) with the intention of creating a state park. When this idea was abandoned, George Pratt persuaded the district to acquire a quarry area for forest conservation. 1974 Pratt expanded the canning to sell its adjacent 250-acre (1.0 km2) Maple Spring farm to the area. Since the beginning of the 20th century, the wetland complex in Pratt's Wayne Woods Brewster Creek district has been artificially drained by a system of buried clay pipes. The Forest Conservation District is now removing these drainage tiles to restore this vital habitat, which has become the home of several endangered and endangered species of plants and animals over the years. In 1990, plans to form a DuPage County-only state park were revived when the state and forest conservation district purchased more than 300 acres (1.2 km2) of Pratt's Wayne Woods area for this purpose. The area, which is still being developed by Dupage Forest Preserve in 2016, is known as Dunham Woods and is adjacent to pratts wayne woods parts of the south-east. Decennial Census[19] Since the 2000 census[20] there have been 2,137 people, 726 households and 630 families living in the village. The population density was 367.4 people per square kilometre (141.8/km2). There were 746 housing units with an average density of 128.3 per square mile (49.5/km2). Racial makeup in the village was 94.81% White, 0.37% African American, 0.05% Native American, 2.81% Asian, 0.75% from other races, and 1.22% of two or more races. Hispanic or Latino in any race was 3.74% of the population. There were 726 households, of which 39.3% had children under the age of 18, 81.8% were married couples living together, 3.7% had a household without a husband and 13.1% were non-family. 10.2% of all households were individuals and 3.4% had one, 65 or older people. The average household size was 2.94 and the average family size was 3.16. The village population was distributed: 27.4% under the age of 18, 4.9% from 18 to 24 years, 26.0% from 25 to 44 years, 33.4% from 45 to 64 years old and 8.3% for 65 years or older. The median age was 41 years. For every 100 women there were 93.2 men. For every 100 women age 18 and over, there were 96.1 men. Between 2011 and 2015, the median household income in the village was \$137,308 and the median family income was \$166,875. [21] Education Village is served by St. Charles District 303 in the southern and western parts and the Elgin Area School District U-46 in the central, northern and eastern parts. The U-46 serves an area of approximately 90 square miles (230 km2) in Cook, DuPage and Kane counties. Almost 40 000 school-age children are on its territory. The U-46 is the second largest school district in Illinois.
