Confederate General Joseph E. JohnstonOne of the first challenges Johnston faced when he relieved Braxton Bragg of Tennessee Army command was a high rate of desertation. On the other hand, upon arrival he gave all the soldiers a week's leave to see his family, gave them all his late payment, and reinded all the welders who left their ranks to their previous position without penalty. To combat other problems, Johnston took deserters to Crow Valley, north of Dalton, and shot them. Born in 1807, Johnston attended West Point (Class of '29). In 1861 he resigned from his commission to join the Confederate forces. He was Brig in May of that year and was put in charge of the Northern Virginia Army. After command was passed to Robert E. Lee he moved to the Western Front and took command of the Tennessee army. His inability to get along with his commanding officer, Jefferson Davis, led to his dismissal during the siege of Atlanta. Faced with an opponent of overwhelming force who performed remarkably, retreating through the middle of the state and losing about as many men as his opponent, William Tecumseh Sherman. After his removal, John Bell Hood lost so many men in less than 6 weeks. At the end of the war Johnston was intervenered to fight a defensive action against Sherman in North Carolina after the March to the Sea. After the war Johnston served as a congressman and railroad commissioner. His analysis of the Civil War in his memoirs was highly appreciated. Upon catching a cold as a coffin bearer at Sherman's funeral, Joseph Johnston died on March 21, 1891 This statue (see image, Whitfield County History) was erected in his honor in October 1912 by the Bryan M. During the Civil War, Civil, he commanded Confederate troops in First Manassas, defended the Confederate capital of Richmond during the Peninsula Campaign of 1862, and participated in the Vicksburg and Atlanta Campaigns in 1863 and 1864. On December 27, 1863, in Dalton, Johnston was appointed to command the Tennessee Army by Confederate President Jefferson Davis. And any relocation or change to the statue of Dalton would have to be approved first by the Daughters of the Confederacy. There has been a significant reaction both online and in person to young organizers. A Facebook group called DON'T LET JOE GO! which was created in the last 24 hours already has more than 5,000 members. A post in the group, made by someone identified as Gary Chapman, says: We're not going to let this daca boy move JOE! Organizers said the comment was addressed to Rodriguez, who is not a beneficiary of the deferred action program for childhood arrivals, or DACA, which gives clemency to immigrants brought to the United States by their parents without authorization. We are experiencing reaction to our demands and some of them have been extreme, Perez said. We're worried about Omar's safety. They are being openly racist on Facebook, and we want to make it clear that we do not approve of any violence. There's no reason for that kind of hate. Perez and Hernandez said they've suffered injustices they're fighting.
