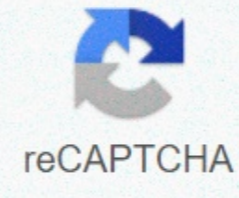

Map View Grand Rapids, Michigan has known many monikers in its time - Furniture City, River City, Beer City USA - but what about Book City? While you can't expect it, this Midwest Hotspot has a rich history of publishing, with several locally grown houses that continue to impact on the market today. Each of the largest publishers in Grand Rapids has a unique story that blends through many of the Dutch culture that shapes the area, as well as the family values that continue to influence the city. Known for its religious and religious reference books, William B. Eerdmans Publishing Company is a star player in religious publishing. The company, founded in 1911, set itself apart early and full comments on John Calvin, founder of Calvinism. Since then, it has become a main in academic publishing and commentary. Despite the gravitas in the tradition, the company continued to branch out into different styles. Most notably, Eerdmans Books for Young Readers, Children and YA footprint, there are a number of award-winning picture books and average class novels in their lists, such as I Put My Stitches Down, a Stream for Word, and Garmann's Summer. Zondervan, now part of Christian Publishing HarperCollins, is another couple at the scene in Publishing Grand Rapids. Zondervan is responsible for the NIV translation of the Bible, as well as many tasks of importing religious academics and Nonfiction Nonfiction Trading, such as Rick Warren's driving life and Ben Carson's beautiful America. Eight newspaper media companies currently printed at the production facility in Walker will be printed in Cleveland early October 5, said Tim Gruber, chief revenue officer of MLive Media Group said. The newspaper will be printed at the same facility that printed the Plain Dealer, which is affiliated with the cleveland.com News. It was a difficult decision, especially since we have these devoted employees who are really focused on helping us be the best that we can be. That decision was not taken lightly, Gruber said. Cleveland.com and MLive Media Group are owned by Advanced Local. There are 71 employees in printing at Walker and distribution facilities, 26 of them full-time and 45 part-time. They will be offered an opportunity to apply for positions at Cleveland's facility. Employees will be offered a package of severely, which has been reinforced due to the pandemic coronavirus, Gruber said. Employees were notified Wednesday. He hopes the building will be offered for sale. The Walker production facility, with its identifying design-like design, opened in 2004 alongside I-96 in western Grand Rapids. It firstly produced Grand Rapids Press, later adding Muskegon Chronicle's, Gazette's Kalamazoo and the Jackson Nationals Patriot. After the closure of the Publishing Valley facility near Bay City in spring 2019, the Walker plant began printing the other four papers owned by MLive Media Group: Ann Arbor News, The Flint Journal, Bay Times and the Saginaws News. The Walker facility printed 375,000 newspapers per week. The facility also printed Gannett publications until recently, when the company pulled production back from home, Gruber said. Local advance officials decided it was meaningful to change production for Cleveland because it was twice in the capacity of the Walker establishment as well as outside printing deals that they wanted to keep," Gruber said. We have a lot more opportunities to do more business at this facility than at the Walker facility, Gruber said. The change should not impact delivery times for print customers unless there are unanticipated vehicles he said that disrupted the truck, he said. The move does not mark the beginning of the end of print newspapers, but rather the opposite, Gruber said. I believe with this cost savings measure, this will allow us to preserve the resources to produce better content that will drive even more readers, he said. Historic Plan: World Publishing Company 1898: Alfred Cahen arrived in London after marching across Europe from Poland, learning the printing business in Poland, Russia, Germany, and Holland. In London he worked for a company that made pamphlets, mandatory libraries, and repaired manuscript for museums with private collectors. 1902: Mr. Cahen left London and came to Ohio where he worked for the Saalfeld Publishing Company in Akron. 1905: Mr. Cahen opened his own linder in Cleveland, the beginning of the Bookbinding Sales Company. 1912: Press cylinder added, provides printing to companies as well as sorrow installation. 1916: The company built its own plant at West 110th Street and Western Avenue. 1920: Fire destroyed the entire plant. 1921: The plant was again in production. 1923: A second building was erected. 1928: A third building was added. Automatic machine, unique in the industry, was designed and built by Mr. Cahen and later adopted by larger book manufacturers as well as the Government Printing Facility. Cahen's two sons, Herman and Julius, both engineers and graduates of Case Institute of Technology, helped build the various vehicles. The World Syndicate Publishing Company was acdered along with offices in New York City. The company began publishing Bible, dictionaries, and children's books. 1929: The company went public with a stock question. LINDBERG, EAGLE OF LONE, written, printed and tied to only one week, becoming the first book on historical flights and global launch of publishing trade. 1930: The company set up an office in Chicago. 1933: Lillian, daughter of Alfred Cahen, married Ben D. Zevin. Lillian worked at the company starting as a teenager in the mid-1920s. He eventually became editor-in-chief and helped lead the company during its most successful years. 1935: Ben D. Zevin joined the company.1936: Another building was placed in the plant house growing. 1939: The series book tower, each title sold at \$49, launched. 1940: The company became the largest publisher of Bible and dictionary in the United States. 1941: Work began on the New World Dictionary New Webster in the American Language. 1942: Forum Books, a \$1.00 reprint line, began, and the child book line was growing bigger. During the Second World War, the 17 million publishing governments of the Bible were distributed to the armed forces, and four out of every ten were made by World War II. 1945: Ben Zevin became president of the company.1949: Rogers Bruce's World Bible Conference was published in a limited edition of 975 copies. 1953: The College Edition of the New World Dictionary was published and quickly became the leading leader of the country's leading college. 1963: The company was sold to The Times Mirror, which eventually sold it to William Collins Sons, Ltd. When this company was disbanded in 1980, the division was sold to Simon > Schuster, which still publishes the New Webster Dictionary. The Bible, children's books and trade have been sold to various other companies, and some of these are still in print. Dimensions and content: The files of the World Publishing Company include correspondence, financial files, pictures, slippery, and various publications. Lillian Zevin's father was Alfred H. Cahen, founder of the World Publishing Company as well as Trade Booking Company Cleveland, Ohio. The collection includes files from the time period of commercial as well as global. But because this collection of files was a personal collection from someone and not the company's official archive, there is some space in the file. However, this collection is still rich in documenting the history of the company and particularly important are the end financial records, as well as records on the high assignments of publishing the world focus: bibles and dictionaries.
