Recently, the San Francisco-based artist has developed pretty cool following. People stand in line to snap up their pottery the moment it hits the shelves at HomeGoods, sometimes just to resell it later at an inflated price. We talked to Dunn about why this makes her sad - and what she wishes her fans knew. VICTORIA SMITH When Rae Dunn (now 54) first touched clay, she was in her 30s. That was 23 years ago, and the woman behind the now famous proverbs knew nothing about pottery. Sure, she started taking piano lessons at the age of four, studying industrial design, and for a while, and sold baby blankets, but she had never even taken an art class. Dunn had only found the find in this pottery class by chance—literally. While walking in Golden Gate Park in San Francisco, the California native discovered a beautiful building that she thought looked like a castle. That building turned out to be Sharon Art Studio, a public space offering classes and workshops. I turned a coin over and it landed on clay. I took first grade and fell completely in love with it. Clay With a Cult Following Years later, and Dunn's pottery has probably also taken over your Instagram feed, especially the series stamped with long, handwritten letters, which are licensed to Magenta and sold exclusively at T.J.Maxx, HomeGoods and Marshalls. It's really become a crazy cult, Dunn says. I never expected it to be so insane. You think we're kidding? Go to one of those stores and ask about their Rae Dunn mug. The staff will probably look at you as if you're crazy and say: No, people are waiting in line just to buy it. Dunn heard the exact words as she looked for her mugs in a store the other day. Unfortunately, she tells us there's nothing she can do about it. After designing the pieces, Dunn essentially has no role in the production of the Magenta lines, which means she has no control over where the pieces are sold and who buys them. She will play the piano for a while and go for a run before starting her workday at 10 a.m., first designing at home and then in the studio. It's usually midnight before she calls it a day. Dunn's style is simple, cozy and organic. She is inspired by the Japanese art form wabi-sabi, or the beauty of imperfection. That's the beauty of everything, she says. When you try too hard, it just becomes inauthentic. Victoria Smith When she first started making pottery, the instructor asked her to smooth out the fingerprints and flaws in the pots, but Dunn disagreed. I liked it only because it looked like someone did it instead of a machine ... I've always been drawn to things that aren't perfect, she explains. I love reddish skin with freckles. For me, it has more character. I love wrinkled clothes, things that show life and use. I've always been drawn to things that aren't perfect. Now she's built a whole business around that philosophy - even though she never had a business plan to begin with. I didn't do it to make money — there was no backdrop — it was just passion. I think that where there is a will there is a way and when you have passion it drives the truck. Rae Dunn The proudest moment of Dunn's career so far? When her mother read an article about her in Martha Stewart Living and finally understood what her daughter was doing —and stopped worrying about whether or not she could make a living in the art world. Until recently, she said, you should really go back to school and get a teaching credential so you have something to fall back on. Or she came to my house and saw all this pottery and said, "When do you find time to do all this?" And I said, Mom, this is what I do. Don't you understand this is my job? But I think when [that article] came out, she could connect it to someone famous and was very proud of it. More than mugs Many Rae Dunn collectors have impressive collections that practically spill out of their cupboards and hutches, which begs the question: Does Dunn own even so many of his own pieces? Absolutely not, she says. The ones she holds on are not from the magenta line, but her handmade, one-of-a-kind work, which is often non-functioning. Rae Dunn All that writing stuff that's out there invading the world, people probably think that's all I do, but it's none of what I really do and love about clay. It is her second boutique line through Magenta, which can buy online, and in her own Etsy store, where she makes handmade pieces (she currently takes a breather on Etsy, however). But she also has two books under her belt: The First Wilmas World from 2015: Good Advice from a Good Dog, is a collection of photographs with Dunn's beloved four-legged friend, who serves as a constant inspiration for the artist. Wilma has changed my life more than anything I think, Dunn says. She gives me so much joy and makes me happy — and she's funny. Dunn's second book, published this spring, is a collection of daily sketches from her annual France residency called France: Inspiration du Jour, inspired by another experience that transformed her into the artist she is today: While she was in Spain in 1993, her camera was stolen, forcing her to record her memories in a different way. Her third book from the Chronicle, scheduled for 2019, will be filled with ways to be inspired - the working title is in Pursuit of Creativity: Things I Do. When someone gets a new sketchbook, it's very scary, so it will give you ideas about what to draw, she says. Don't worry: She's not walking away from ceramics. But Dunn plans to change things up a little bit. In October, expect to see some of the sketches from her second book appear on porcelain ceramics in her boutique line at Magenta, instead of words.
