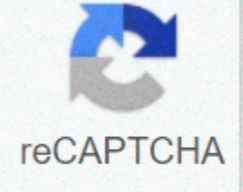




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The big selling point behind movie download is practical. You don't have to get in a car, queue or spend days waiting while your DVDs travel back and forth between your home and a shipping center. But choosing a service that doesn't meet your needs can make the process pale in comparison to other buying and rental methods. The first thing to keep in mind is the platform that the site requires. Most movie sites require Windows XP. Some will also work with Windows Vista or Windows 2000. Only the iTunes Music Store supports the Macintosh operating system, and none of the major sites support linux. Most websites also require Internet Explorer and Windows Media Player. Although you can view most websites in Firefox, the MovieLink site will only work with Internet Explorer with ActiveX control enabled. Amazon Unbox requires Microsoft.Net framework, and Vongo requires a proprietary program. Ad For many users, the next big deal-breaker is the site's choice. Download sites get their movies from movie studios, which own the digital rights to the movies. A website can't offer the film without first negotiating a deal with the studio. Some websites, like MovieLink, have deals with many major studios, so they have a wide variety of regular movies. Others, like Guba, have a selection of free, independent films as well as studio releases that you can rent for a fee. Vongo is owned by Starz Entertainment, and the selection reflects only what Starz has the right to broadcast. When you find a website with a selection of movies you like, the next thing you should look at is the quality of your movies. There are a couple of measurements to keep in mind. One is resolution, which is measured in pixels. The higher the resolution, the better the image quality. For example, the movies in Wal-Mart's video download store have a resolution of 640 x 480 pixels, which is the same as the lowest standard TV resolution. Wal-Mart also offers a scaled-down version for portable media players with a resolution of 320 x 240 pixels. You can also measure quality in bit rate, often measured in bits per second (bps). The higher the bit rate, the better the quality - DVD bitrate is about 5 kilobits per second (kbps), or 5000 fps. The codec, or the application that encodes and decodes the digital video, can also significantly affect the quality of the video. However, sites do not always specify which codec they are using. Finally, before buying or renting movies online, you should thoroughly read the site's terms of use and familiarize yourself with drm. Some websites are relatively flexible. Other sites offer far fewer options - for example, Amazon Unbox received criticism shortly after launch for the perceived lack of flexibility of its Use. Several websites allow you to create a backup disc that will only play on your computer originally used to download the file. For sites that use streaming media, you never really own a copy of the movie, you just see it while it's streaming. Once you've found a website that meets your platform, selection, quality, and terms of use criteria, a few simple questions can help you make your final choice: How much do the movies cost? Are they almost as expensive as DVDs? If so, do you prefer to find a cheaper option or to stick to higher quality DVDs? Do your rental and purchase options match what you're looking for? If your site offers a subscription program, does it have enough movies you're interested in to make it worth it? Are your movies compatible with portable devices you want to use to watch them? An extensive database that goes beyond the opening theme song, the song above the credits or the melody all the characters dance to - it has the less remarkable numbers from a movie that only real fans will recognize. With more than 45,000 titles to choose from, SoundtrackCollector.com for the serious musician and soundtrack enthusiast who is truly a fan of composers and the often brilliant and understated work they do for each film. With what may be the largest database of movie audio tracks online, ArtistDirect.com provide most of these downloads for free (with a fee that must be paid for access to others). But most of the soundtracks that are the easiest to find are mainstream pop songs that have been bought for the soundtrack, not necessarily from composers who have made film results. Remember this if you are looking for something reasonably unclear. Last.fm seems to have most music tracks in its database the challenge comes with finding these tracks. Here we take you through the process of both downloading and deleting movies and applications from the Disney+ app. Explore Disney+ Download movies and apps at Disney+ Step 1: Choose your download quality Before we have fun, let's talk about file sizes. If you're in pain for storage space on your iPhone or Android smartphone, Disney+ has a variable-quality feature that lets you sacrifice visual rendering for a smaller digital footprint. Open the Disney+ app on your smartphone (iOS, Android) and click the profile icon in the lower-right corner. From there, go to App Settings &t; Download Quality. You will see options for standard, medium and high, the latter likely offering no higher than 1080p resolution. Step 2: Download your content Because you can view all Disney+ titles offline, no guessing or filter is required to find downloadable content. The hardest part of this task is figuring out what you want to look at. Once you've figured it out, you just need to do it from the entry for the movie or show, pressing the download button, located at the far right of the Play button below the title's logo. For programs, you can also find a separate download button next to each episode if you don't want the whole season. Disney takes care of the magic from there. It's a relatively fast download on Wi-Fi, especially on lower qualities, so you can probably snag dozens of movies in the couple of hours before the flight if you forgot to do it the night before. Step 3: Watch your downloaded movies and show All that's left to do now is enjoy yourself! An easy way to find your downloads is to tap the download icon, which is always visible in the lower-right corner of the Disney+ app. All your content will be listed here, sorted by the time you downloaded. Tap the play button on the thumbnail of what you want to watch and go off. The episodes are listed a little differently - they are nested a single label, label, label, label, by pressing it will present all the episodes you have downloaded for that show, grouped by season. You can also find these titles through regular searching and browsing. You know that something is available for offline viewing if you see a smartphone icon where the download button usually sits. How much space do I need? The amount of storage space each title eats is mainly based on video length and resolution, and with other variables recorded in the equation - the largest being the quality setting - this number can vary greatly. We downloaded three movies of similar length and resolution - some of which the Star Wars movies, which clock in at just over two hours each - to see how each of the options affects the file size. Empire Strikes Back on standard quality was 0.92 GB for a 2-hour, 7-minute runtime, while A New Hope on medium needed 1.4 GB for 2 hours and 4 minutes. It's a modest jump compared to Return of the Jedi on high quality, which needed 5.5GB in 2 hours and 14 minutes. For shows, a 39-minute episode of The Mandalorian on high quality takes 1.5 GB, but only 270 MB on standard and 424 MB on medium. Finally, at a 3-hour, 1-minute runtime, The Avengers: End Game needs a whopping 7.1 GB. Using the data above, you can find out a rough estimate of how much space you need to save everything you want. You can mix and match by adjusting the quality setting before you start the download. Now would also be an excellent time to specify whether you need a Wi-Fi connection to download content, an option those on restricted data certainly should consider. By default, Disney+ enables Downloads for Wi-Fi only. What is available? As explained above, everything in the Disney+ catalog can be downloaded for offline consumption. Whether it's an entire season of Darkwing Duck or every movie from the Marvel Cinematic Universe, if it's on Disney+, you can download it. Unlike some other services, Disney+ is pretty loose for restrictions. Firstly, you can download a single title of up to 10 different devices at a time, and you can download some of them as often as you want. The only thing Disney asks for is that you connect to Disney+ every 30 years. How do I delete titles? Finally, you want to make room for something new. Whether you want to delete a single title or a bunch at once, the Disney+ task makes delightfully easy. Step 1: Delete a single title When you want to delete titles from your device, the process is much easier than downloading files. In fact, it will take you only a few seconds to delete something from Disney+. First, find your content by going to the download section. You can access the download area by tapping the second icon from the right side of the app's navigation bar. Find the movie you want to delete and click the smartphone icon to the right of the title.
