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Silicone candle molds To make a new candle, you will need to melt old wax pieces together. For best results, make sure that your old wax pieces are very similar in perfumes or wax colors can result in an unpleasant smell or an unattractive color [source: Peterson]. You will also want to make sure to break the pieces of wax into smaller pieces using an old knife or a hammer and chisel. Smaller pieces will make removing old wicks, filter the wax through cheese cloth during the spill to pick up wicks and any other debris [source: DIY NETWORK]. After collecting your pieces of old candles, select the templates you want to use. Shot cups, sake cups, coffee mugs and other glass or ceramic objects make good candle molds [source: DIY Network]. Prepare the mold with a thin layer of cooking spray or wax-releasing spray to facilitate the removal of the candle once it is cold [source: Help of candles]. Then center the pre-waxed wick at the bottom of the mold. You can also set the wick after pouring the hot wax if you prefer. Advertising Now that your mold is ready, set up your fusion device. Heat a double boiler on the stove or create your own by placing a pan of old sauce in a slightly larger half-inlet filled with water. When the double boiler is hot, place the pieces of wax on top to start the melting process. When the wax melts, pour the liquid wax into the mold and allow to cool. If using fresh flowers, cover a cookie sheet with a layer of kitten trash and place the flowers and leaves on top. Sprinkle enough kitten litter over the flowers and leaves on top. Sprinkle enough kitten litter over the flowers to cover completely. Let it dry in a cool, dry place (where the kitten can't get to them!) for at least a week, (Silicone beads work the same way. but they will dry the flowers in 24 to 48 hours.) 2. Carefully remove the flowers from the litter and place them in a nice arrangement on a sheet of paper. 3. Use a little Stick-one to fix the flowers from the litter and place them in a nice arrangement is complete, making sure that the flowers remain flat against the candle. 4.
