There are now several hundred font types for countless communication formats. Fonts can vary from letter to letter depending on the author’s or publisher’s purpose. Newspapers, books, magazines, and online publishers use common fonts that make readability easier and communicate the culture of your organization. Serif fonts are the most common type of font. Serif fonts are defined at the end of each letter with a small decoration. Serif fonts are most commonly used in professional publications such as newspapers, magazines, magazines, and books. Grotesque is the oldest and rarest form of sans serif, but includes Franklin Gothic, a type of font available in Microsoft Word. Helvetica and Arial are examples of neo-grotestik styles. Humanist styles are considered the most readable of sans-serif fonts and include Lucida Grande, Tahoma and Veranda. Geometric styles are least used for publishing. Photoshop text effects, also called styles, allow you to add color schemes, textures, and other variations to fonts. Text effects take the font much further than we have shown tutorials on creating and flourishing a vortex with text or editing text type and text. Text effects or styles should not be confused with special effects that include features such as Shadow, 3D effects, lighting, and depth, and apply to both text and shapes. Then, select a style from the Styles gallery.3. Choose a different style for each word/layer to display a variety of styles. Customize or create custom styles The easiest way to customize or create custom styles is to break down (to individual sections) an existing style to see how it’s done. Because it is that the same styles are installed on our systems, the Default Palette style is used.1. Type the words Talta Talta and choose a thick, heavy font such as Articola Display, Arial Bold, Bremen Blk-BT, or Swiss Heavy.2. In the Styles palette, choose a style called Chiseled Sky (it’s blue and white and the top 13th style). JD Sartain / PC World Style Blending Options default submenu 3. Go to the Layers gallery and note that the layer style effects associated with this layer are displayed on a layer named Taltaitaivas. Try the direction up/down (select Down), try a size from 1 to 250 (select 200), which changes the depth size of the musty and softened feature (from 1 to 16), which turns the svelly chisel look swollen, pillow look.9. Next, select the gradient layer. Click the arrow next to Blend Mode and try different mixing options. Adjust transparency according to the brightness/contrast of each mixing mode.
