Primary school teachers generally need more or less in education, or need to earn a master's degree in education for their post-baccalaureate. Some states require all teachers to have a master's degree. Have a degree in the subject they teach in middle school or high school. Meet the requirements for student teaching. Pass a State Teaching Degree or Practice Exam [source: Teachers Count]. Many states use the National Teachers' Examination (NTE), which is administered by the Educational Testing Service. NTE tests general knowledge, communication skills and professional skills, and includes separate tests on all specific subjects a teacher may wish to specialize in [source: ERIC]. Some states, especially those with a shortage of teachers, have established programs to license non-traditional candidates as teachers. These applicants must have a bachelor's degree in the subject they want to teach, pass a licensing exam and complete a program to prepare teachers. They may need to complete a supervised internship as well as [source: Teacher Count]. School administrators and district officials seek out the best candidates when hiring new teachers. Competition is tough, and your resume can get just a few short minutes of attention. Include all relevant experiences with children and teenagers - it can make the difference between appearing inexperienced or highly skilled. Activities that highlight your commitment to youth and a passion for going beyond make your RESUME stand out and can land you as desired interview. Excellence in your position as a student teacher is of paramount importance. While your best efforts must be saved for the classroom, if you can find time to engage in other activities, without sacrificing the quality of your lessons, do so at every opportunity. Supervising students in wards, attending staff meetings and parent-teacher conferences, helping out on sports day, and accompanying students on field trips demonstrates your ability to cope with a teacher's reality outside the classroom. All previous experience with young people is important, especially those who show leadership. Maybe you've worked as a camp counselor, a private tutor or even a babysitter. Any activity that requires patience or familiarity with the behavior of adolescents is worth including. For example, summer and part-time work like working in a bowling alley or toy store shows your interest in dealing with children. All voluntary activities that you have participated in, such as helping out at your local school, church or all- and middle-class community, enhance your CV. Show your eagerness to participate in leisure activities by highlighting all the drama, music, dance and sports activities you've participated in — these areas are in demand with children of all ages. Perhaps you have been a swimming teacher, dance teacher or performed in amateur theatre groups. These activities reflect your commitment to art and sports and suggest a willingness to coach and mentor students in the school who hire you. Include activities that reflect skills that improve your ability to teach specific subjects or to monitor leisure activities. For example, if you are a geography or history teacher and participated in an archaeological dig, include that experience. Any writing or editing work is relevant to a secondary school teacher in English or an elementary school teacher. Don't forget any interests or hobbies that show a creative flair or excellence in something out of the ordinary. For example, all the awards you may have won at the chess championships are impressive. Many vacancies attract many candidates. Your RESUME gives you a chance to stand out from the average teachers in the pool and paint yourself as the highly qualified teacher the schools are looking for. In addition to your training, your RESUME must be an overview of the skills and qualities you possess that make you the best teacher for the job. Write a resume goal that concisely sums up the position you hope to get and what you bring to or hope to win from the position. For example, your goal may be to get a position as a middle school teacher with the ability to leverage my creativity and make a significant difference in the lives of pre-teens and teens. If you want to teach at a specific grade level or topic, include that information in your goal. Include the name of the school in your goal to show that you took the time to customize your RESUME. In the summary of the permission section, you highlight your training and experience. Create a summary that gives potential employers a snapshot of your skills and experiences. Wrap as much relevant information as possible in this short paragraph, or create a section with three to four bulleted lists. In the related experience section, include any experience related to teaching or working with children. This includes tutoring, working at a summer camp or volunteering with youth organizations. If you are applying to teach a particular subject, describe your subject-related experience, such as working in a lab if you want to become a science teacher. Add references to your RESUME to make it easy for employers to verify your qualifications. If you have taught before, include the principal of the last place you worked. If you have not previously worked as a teacher but have a student taught, include the name of the teacher you worked with during your student teaching experience. Other references include those in administrative or senior positions at your former school and your mentors in the field. Before you put a reference on your resume, be sure that the individual is willing to give you a positive reference. While it may be tempting to list any and all educational experiences and skills on your resume, keep your RESUME to one page. Where possible, include industry-specific keywords or jargon, such as curriculum planning, Common Core State Standards, student success, assessment, and classroom management. Tailor your RESUME to school or district. For example, if the district caters to students from Hispanic homes, add information about your experience with ESL education. Think of your teaching resumed as a marketing tool. Whether you start your first career as a teacher or you became a teacher as a second career choice, write a CV that shows a prospective employer how well you fit the profile he is looking for. If you are careful to show off your accomplishments and craft statements about yourself and your relevant and interesting, you increase your chances of catching the eye of the administrator and a call for an interview. References Tips If you are currently employed, use the present tense, instead of past-temp, in your statements. Print your resume on high-quality paper that is white or white in color. Stay away from other colors to appear professional. You can include both an objective section and a core competency section on your resume. If you have space and you want to grab your reader's attention, consider adding an Additional Information section at the bottom of the resume with quotes from your former employers, professors or supervisors. The quotes should exemplify how well suited you are for a teaching career. Warnings Be truthful. Never embellish your skills or duties to impress an employer as it can backfire and damage your credibility. Do not list your credentials on you resume; this may make the document difficult. Instead, create a reference page that you can give to a potential employer at her request.
