Because of the content of the novel, he was a frequent target of censorship and appears in the American Library Association's 100 most contested book list from 1990 to 2000. [1][2][3] Plot summary Katherine, in the middle of her senior year in high school, finds herself deeply attracted to Michael, a boy she meets at a New Year's party. As their relationship unfolds, the issue of sex turns out to be more like an emotional and health issue than a moral one. Both of them know that physical intimacy is both common and complex. Their relationship progresses slowly as they start going on dates and trips together; they are accompanied by various meetings of Katherine's girlfriend Erica, who has known Katherine since 9th grade, and thinks that sex is a physical act and not very romantic, and thinks Katherine should just get out of the way. Erica and Katherine were also joined by Michael's friend Artie, who got along with Erica; they divorced after he told her he would commit suicide, but he would not harm himself. He is a depressed teenager who does not know what to do with his life. He shows his depression when he tries to hang himself from his shower curtain rod, but fails and gets himself hospitalized for the rest of the novel. Katherine and Michael go on a ski trip where they plan to have sex, but Katherine has her period and they are disappointed. Michael teaches Katherine how to hold her penis (nicknamed Ralph) and how to rub correctly. When Katherine and Michael have sex on Michael's sister's living room floor in her apartment, they are sure she will seal the love that will be forever. Michael buys Katherine his birthday necklace that says both of her names on it and she also says Perpetual. However, separated by a summer job that takes them to two different states, Katherine finds herself aware of the limitations of the relationship and eventually attracts a tennis instructor, Theo, who is older than Michael. Theo is a cat because everyone else does it, although she is very irritated by the nickname. She shares a kiss with him, and takes responsibility for breaking the news to Michael when it comes to a surprise visit. Michael realizes she has found something else, and Katherine gives him back forever necklace before he takes off. She realizes that she could get through it. The book ends with Katherine's mother giving her a message that Theo called her. Characters major Katherine Danziger figure in the book. Katherine is nearly 18, and turns 18 in the book, and is a high school senior who is getting ready for college. When she meets Michael, she falls in love with him and starts a relationship with him. One of the novel's central storylines is her decision to lose her virginity to him, as well as the sexual relationships they share together. After she broke up with Michael she started one with Theo Michael Wagner Boy, which Katherine meets and with whom Katherine falls in love. He is a senior at another high school nearby. They meet on New Year's Eve, and their relationship develops from there. Michael wanted to love Katherine, but tried not to pressure her into it too much and respected her for not being ready until she was ready to let go of her virginity. He nicknamed his penis Ralph. They manage to keep the relationship together for several months until it collapsed. Erica Small Katherine is a best friend who gives her emotional support because of Erica's ability to see situations from a realistic point of view. She sees sex as a physical act, not a romantic, unlike Katherine, and just wanted her to get to know it. Artie Levin is a boy who is friends with Katherine and Michael. He's not very confident in himself, and after Erica breaks down with him at a party, he scares her by saying he's going to kill himself. After two days he tries, so he can't graduate from high school and his hospitalization for the rest of the book. Minor Ralph Michael's penis. This book was first published in 1975. My daughter Randy asked for a story about two beautiful children who have sex without any of them having to die. She has read several novels about teenagers in love. If they had sex the girl was always punished by an unplanned pregnancy, a hasty trip to a relative in another state, a grisly abortion (illegal in the U.S. until the 1970's), sometimes even death. Is. Secret. At least one life has been ruined. Girls in these books had no sexual feelings, and boys had no feelings other than sexual. Neither took responsibility for his actions. I wanted to present another kind of story in which two seniors in high school fall in love, decide to have sex together, and behave responsibly. In the 1970s, there was a time when sexual responsibility meant preventing unwanted pregnancies. Today, sexual responsibility also means preventing sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV/AIDS. In this book, Katherine visits the clinic and gives her a recipe for The Pill. Today, she would be told that it is very important to use a condom together with any other birth control method. If you are going to become sexually active, you must take responsibility for your actions. So get the facts first. 1 Sybil Davison is a genius I.Q. and has been identified by at least six different guys. She told me that she last visited her cousin Eric, who is my good friend. Erica says that this is a problem for Sybil's fat and her need to feel loved, to get down the part, that is. Genius I.Q. is just a success, genes or something like that. I'm not sure that any explanation is 100 percent right, but usually Erica is very good at analyzing people. I don't know Sybil that well because she lives at the summit and we live in Westfield. Erica and I decided to go to our New Year's party at the last minute for two reasons- for one, because that was when she invited us, and, two, we had nothing better to do. It turned out to be a fondue country. There were maybe twenty of us sitting on the floor around a low table in the Sybil family room. On the table there were a couple of large pots of steaming baskets of liquid Swiss cheese and pieces of bread. Each of us had a long two-way fork, spear bread, then immersed it in cheese. He tasted pretty well. I got about two bites when this guy said, You have a little bit on the chin. He was on the other side of Erica, as if leaning over her. You want you to wipe it off? He kept his napkin. I couldn't tell if he's putting me on or what. I told him I can my chin, and I tried to swallow the bread that was still in my mouth. I'm Michael Wagner, he said. So? I answered how Erica shot me. She introduced herself to Michael, then tapped me on the head and said, This idiot is my friend, Katherine. Don't mind her . . . it's a little weird. I noticed, Michael said. He wore glasses, had lots of reddish-high hair and a small mole on his left cheek. For some crazy reason, I was thinking about touching it. I looked away and went back to spear slices of bread. On my other side the guy said, My name is Fred. I live near Sybil. I'm a darnmooz freshman. Unfortunately, it was also creeping. After a while I turned him in, but he didn't know and kept blabbing away. I was more interested in what Michael said to Eric. I wondered where he went to school and I oped it was a place close to rutgers. Erica told him that we're from Westfield, that we're seniors and that we spend the night at Sybil's. Then Michael introduced her to someone named Elizabeth and I turned around in time to see him put his hand around this light-haired girl sitting next to him. I pretended to be interested in Fred Creep after all. At midnight Sybil flashed the lights on and off and Fred wished me a happy New Year, then tried stuffing his tongue into his mouth. I kept my lips closed tight; While he was kissing me. I watched Michael kiss Elizabeth. It was much taller than I first thought and thin, but not skinny. After the party we helped Sybil and her parents clean up and somewhere around 3:00 .m we trudged upstairs to bed. Sybil conked right away when her head hit the pillow, but Erica and I had a hard time getting to sleep, maybe because we were on the floor sleeping bags, maybe because Sybil was snoring so loudly. Erica Whispered: Michael is a nice guy . . . do you not think so? It's too tall for you, I told her. You only come to your belly button. He can enjoy that. Oh, Erica! She propped herself up on the elbow and said, You like it, don't you? Make no mistake stupid. . . We barely met. I roll over, facing the wall. So... but I can still say, Go to sleep! He asked me for your name and phone number. I turned around. Did he? Uh huh . . . but I think you don't care. She buried herself inside her sleeping bag. I gave her a carry-on blow. Then we both laughed and fell asleep. Erica and I have been friends since ninth grade. We are a good couple because it is open and unfettered, and I am not. She says it has to be that way to compensate for its size. She's only four feet ten, so when I said she would come to Michael's belly button I didn't Everyone in her family is small. That's how her great-grandfather got her last name. He came to this country from Russia, not to speak English. So when he got out of the boat and the man in charge asked for his name, he didn't understand. Instead of simply calling him Cohen or Goldberg, as immigration officials did with so many Jewish refugees, this man sized it up and wrote down Mr. Small. Erica swears if her own gets married she will choose something huge that if they decide to have children children at least will have the opportunity to grow to a normal size. Not that there is little hurt for everyone in your family. Her mother is Juliette Small, a film critic. You can read her reviews in three national journals. She yawned and flopped back to her bed. Erica was still cold. I asked Sybil: Is he coming with that girl, Elizabeth? Not that I know about . . . why, are you interested? No... just curious . . . because I could drop a hint if you want me. . . No... No. I know him from kindergarten. Is he in your class? My home room. Oh... I thought he was older. He's a senior . . . same as us. O... He looked older. Well... as long as I wake up, I can also dress up. I said, going to the bathroom. Sybil and I were in the kitchen when the bell sounded. I picked raisin from breakfast buns, twisting them in the corner of my plate. Sybil leaned on the refrigerator, spooning strawberry yogurt from cardboard. She answered the front door and showed Michael in the kitchen. Remember Katherine, don't you? she asked. Course... Hello... Michael said. O... Hello, I said back. Your records are still at the bottom. Sybil told him, I'll get them for you. That's good, Michael said. I'll get them myself. A few seconds later, he called: What is K.D.? I did, I replied. Some of these albums are mine. I went downstairs and started going through a heap. Are you tagged? No. I'd take the K.D.s stack when he said, Look... and grabbed my wrist. I came here because I wanted to see you again. Oh, okay. I saw my reflection in his glasses. Is that all you can say? What should I say? Do I have to write a script? Well... I'm glad you're here. He smiled. It's better. What about a ride? My car's out the front. My father comes to pick me up at 3:00. By then, I have to go back. It's okay. He was still holding my wrist. 2 Everyone says Erica has insight. I think that's how she knew I was interested in Michael until I recognized that to everyone, including me.
