Despite facing the worst budget crisis in district history, the Los Alamikos Unified School District will not be fired during the 2011-12 fiscal year, the school board announced tonight. At Tuesday night's board meeting, board president Karen Russell said the board had decided not to fire district employees who were classified and qualified because dismissals are disruptive to students, staff and schools and do not meet our mutual interests. The decision is pushed by two key sources of funding: the Federal Employment Law Fund and the District's reserves. The Federal Employment Law Fund provided \$1.8 million, with the rest coming from reserves, which the District attributes to prudent financial management, employee salary concessions and parental generosity. The news comes on the heels of budget projections that Superintendent Gregory Franklin says were the worst in the district. It could cut the District's \$90 million budget by \$200,000 or \$3.28 million, depending on whether California lawmakers make tax extensions to their ballots. with the frugality of the boardThe Employment Law Fund, district employees don't have to fall victim to state budget issues, Russell said. More importantly, the decision to keep all teachers means class sizes will not increase, so the news is positive for LAUSD students, added Russell. In a statement read on behalf of the board, Russell credited negotiations between the employee association and the district for excellence in education, employees to come to the table and discuss what we need to do and everyone is very open about what needs to be done to maintain excellence, she said. Board member Jeffrey Barke commented on the good news, noting that the board's only way to save jobs was by being fiscally conservative in the past. As the Los Alamikos Unified School District Committee met Tuesday night to vote on the firing of 300 confidential employees, McDaid, office coordinator for McGauGhu Elementary School in Seal Beach, told the board about the importance of school positions that stood up for elimination. Over the years, we do more in less time, handling more responsibilities, from security to learning new programs, new software, dealing with all types of positions, and filling in where there is a void. We are now rewarded for being basically eliminated or abolished all entirely, McDaid, who is also a member of the California Association of School Employees (CSEA) union, said during the board meeting. The CSEA is a union that oversees more than 230,000 confidential public servants in the state. Faced with a new education paradigm shift, the Los Alamikos Unified School District voted unanimously to send dismissal notices to 300 confidential employees, including campus nurses, special education assistants and childcare workers, due to a lack of jobs on campus and mandatory school closures by health officialsPrevent the spread of coronavirus. Workers received a notice this week and it is expected to take effect in October. Unfortunately, we have different learning models that have distance (learning), hybrid or completely, different staffing needs, Los Alamikos Unified School District Superintendent Andrew Pulver said. The school board's decision as schools in Orange County and across the state work to safely reopen brick and mortar school campuses and adapt to new distance learning modules for the next school year as part of an effort to curb the number of COVID-19 cases. The Los Alamitos school district oversees more than 10,000 students at nine schools and 1,700 employees. School employees classified as workers who are not teachers or administrators are most affected by coronavirus. The list includes administrative personnel, campus supervision, maintenance, daycare, health clerks, media centers, special education assistants, and nurses. In June, facing a \$35 million budget shortfall and restructuring, the Capistrano Unified School District voted to lay off 88 confidential employees. Some employees let go by working in school behavior and mental health services. The Cypress Unified School District has cut 170 confidential employees from their salaries, but some have been redeployed, according to CSEA union officials. According to the June board, the cuts would save the Cypress School District somewhere between \$800,000 and \$1 million. The Los Alamitos Unified School District is not facing a budget shortfall. On Tuesday, the school showed \$12 million in revenue in its budget, but Inspector Parver said it was a false budget. The district also received \$4.7M from the government's CARES Act, which cannot be used by people or staff. That's a one-time expenditure, board officials said. The majority of part-time and full-time cuts in school districts are specially educated. According to the board, at least 140 special education guidance assistants will be let go. Other roles to be eliminated or abolished as the board said include more than 50 extended daycare assistants, 50 student supervisors and seven nurses. Pulver said some of these employees could return and the board could revoke the notice of dismissal if the school's reopening situation improves. It's not a very good time to be a director, and I absolutely hate the fact that I have to do this, but I also have to protect my finances, said board member Karen Russell. Without funding, you can't run a school district. Hopefully everything will be back to normal and we can get everyone back, Spectrum News 1's email to Los Alamikos School District and to Pulver for more information The dismissal was not returned at the time of press time. Erika Williams, CSEA labor relations representative, said unions were being woken by the massive number of people being laid off. This is the biggest layoff of my year as part of CSEA, said Williams, who oversees five school districts in Orange County. They lay off more than half of the district's membership. Williams said the Los Alamikos School District only notified the union in a four-minute phone call at the end of Friday. Instead of diverting jobs or negotiating the impact of their decision with us, they just went ahead and did it, Williams said. You're literally in tears trying to think about what to do with your family and children. It is absolutely heartbreaking. Williams said teachers and students would be most affected by the board's decision. The union will meet with members this week to decide what happens next. We're going to fight back, Williams said.
