If you can't perform the role of learning coach, you can select another trusted adult, be a family member or a friend, to help you. In many cases, students have more than one learning coach, depending on who is at home with them or where they are physically located. Students who do not know how to manage their time may have difficulty doing all their lessons every day, which could cause them to fall behind in the learning process.
