Please try all possible spelling variations when checking a name. In recent centuries spelling names have not been corrected. In addition, at the beginning of Jamaica there were people with a wide variety of accents - Irish, Scottish, English with Cockney or other accents, French, Spanish or Portuguese who spoke broken English, and Africans who had previously spoken different African dialects but tried to learn English from the same people. A large percentage of people could not read, write or spell their names. The person who writes a record or document is left to try to write down what they heard. For names like *Macfarlane* please try *Macfarlane*, *Da Costa* becomes *Dacosta*, *De la Roche* becomes *Delroche*. For a name like *D'Aquilar* please try *Aquilar*. Etc. Please do not restrict your use of this site to use this search function only. There are many variations in name giving.
