One way to do this is by fulfilling your child's desire for freedom (which is a natural developmental event, by the way) by way) allowing him to participate in a variety of approved activities. Playing on the basketball team, for example, offers your child an outlet for many things: camaraderie, physical activity and even peer pressure. Yes, peer pressure can have a good side. Just ask any tween who has flunked pre-algebra, was on the bench by the coach and let down her teammates. That won't happen again. Even better, organized extracurricular activities offer your child a (supervised) opportunity to escape your watchful eyes. But you can still join cheers at the games, applauding a two-act game or going to an art exhibition. Whatever interests your child, give him an avenue to explore it. Your role is to offer limits, limitations, and support. One way you can practice your role is when it's time for work. The National Association of School Psychologists says the paper teaches children how to time, make choices and solve problems. Help your child create a system -- a place and time to study with the necessary resources -- and then let them face the challenges of working in high school without your presence. Stay in touch with teachers, even if your child assures you that this is the ugliest thing you've ever done. Personally, we don't start worrying until we talk about tattoos and multiple piercings come into play. As you guide your middle-aged man, remember: Your role is not one of perfection. The key is to participate even as you allow your tween more autonomy.
