While some may mourn the loss tangible in our daily lives, watching an online movie eliminates problems by losing or damaging fragile discs and making movies available on different platforms, so you can watch movies of your own anywhere, at any time, without having to remember to grab your DVD. Of course, illegal downloading and streaming is very popular, but it leaves many people who worked to make a film compensation they deserve for their blood, sweat and tears. In addition, the options available can often be of low quality and you are at risk of infecting your computer or mobile device with a virus if you don't know what you're doing. Here's a guide to many different legal ways to watch movies online for those who don't feel the process, who are longing to break free from scratched-DVD hell. Yes, it will cost you a little money, but there are many benefits to both traditional DVDs and illegal downloads. Streaming Services There are litany of options for watching content online. One of the most popular methods is using an online streaming service like Netflix, Hulu Plus, or Amazon's Prime Instant Video. These services charge either a monthly or annual fee and give you access to tons of content, although there's always a chance that a particular movie you're looking for isn't what streaming service you have. The content that these services have access to changes whenever they make new deals, so you're not stuck with the same choices from month to month. The services mentioned above are also excellent for tv viewing and have begun to make their original shows to compete in the television market. Many of these shows, such as Netflix's House of Cards and Orange is the New Black, have received glowing reviews. There are some limited options for streaming online that are both legal and free. Crackle is a website that offers movies and TV shows to stream for free, but it's ad-supported and you end up seeing about as many commercials as you would be watching programming cable. The amount of content Crackle offers is also thinner picks than subscription services, since the site doesn't have the financial muscle to make giant content purchases like larger sites, so it may be harder to find your favorite movie. The drawback of the online streaming service is you're at the mercy of the content the company is available to offer; you can't just choose any movie under the sun and be guaranteed to be able to watch it. You also don't own movies, so when Netflix releases your favorite movie you'll find can't look at it. Downloading one way to download your movies and watch them online is to download them. Whether you're a Google or Apple fan, both iTunes and the Google Play Store offer movies to buy through accounts that become yours. New editions cost about \$20, about the same price a DVD would cost, although a digital copy cannot be lost or damaged. Of course, buying individual titles of your own is more expensive than paying a small fee for a streaming service and getting access to oodles of content. Both iTunes and Google Play also offer movies to rent at a lower price. Renting gives you the opportunity to watch a movie once in a 30-day period and 24 hours to finish it after you have clicked on the play. These options are also great for exchanging devices such as iTunes and Google Play remembering where you're in a movie when you're interrupted and want to go to your TV tablet or smartphone. Amazon offers movies to buy or rent at similar price points as Apple and Google, and you don't need Prime membership to access this service. Additional guides for big players Sony Crackle, crackle or Crackle Plus If known simply as crackle, this free streaming site is through almost as many name changes as P. Diddy. Initially controlled by Sony, it is now a joint venture between Sony and Chicken Soup Soul Entertainment (CSS). This partnership created a new unit called Crackle Plus and was thought to be the name of the streaming service. But one look at the site and it's clear that simplicity is winning: It's just called Crackle. Whatever you call it, the service includes content from six ad-supported CSS streaming services (Popcornflix, Popcornflix Kids, Popcornflix Comedy, Frightpix, Españollix and Truli), as well as some Sony movies and TV shows. You'll find some high-quality low-budget hits like Election, Bernie, Coneheads and Train to Busan, and generous smattering of obscure-but-interesting B-movies. Crackle is great although constant interruptions to advertisers can be old quite quickly. The service is offered in 21 countries but has closed its Canadian, Latin American and Australian offerings. IMDb TV Newer to this roundup is an Amazon-owned IMDb TV (formerly known as Freevid). Free ad-supported TV shows and movies are available on site. In February 2020, the service acquired the rights to more than 20 Disney-owned series, including Lost, Desperate Housewives, Malcolm in the Middle, and My So-Called Life. It is also the only site that allows you to stream Lost and Malcolm in the middle for free. Other TV shows in its relatively small library include Psych, White Collar, 3rd Rock From the Sun and Schitt's Creek. It has a number of hit movies including the Hunger Games series, Groundhog Day, Isle of Dogs, Big Fish, Rudy, Glory, and many more award winners and cult classics. You can watch IMDb TV on the web, Amazon Fire devices and Apple TV, and an Amazon Prime app that you'll find on many smart TVs, tablets and phones. IMDb TV is U.S.-only now, even though European expansion is in the works. Vudu Walmart-owned Vudu may be better known for its subscription streaming service, but the platform also has an impressive and free ad-supported content section. Titles like Ella Enchanted, Preacher's Wife and Hungover Games are good examples of what you can find. If you take a cruise through the site with a selection of 4K/HDR titles, there are even one or two free-to-watch options. You still need a Vudu account, but you can create one for free. The Vudu app is already supported by many platforms, including Roku, Apple TV, game consoles and more. Additionally, there is an app for most mobile devices. Vudu is only available in the U.S. How it's a good deal. Sign up for a library card and get free downloads or streams of movies, without ads at all. This is a deal if you use Hoopla, a digital media streaming platform that has partnered with local libraries to allow members access to rechargeable content online. It's similar to Overdrive, but more than just e-books and audiobooks. The availability of any given title depends on your location and the number of copies available for download, but we found some surprisingly decent flicks when we checked in October 2020. Streaming works with the browser on any device, while downloads require the Hoopla app on your mobile device. Not every library currently supports Hoopla, so make sure you ask. So far, libraries in the U.S. and Canada have access to Hoopla. YouTube This one is a no-brainer. Everyone knows YouTube is the largest video-hosting service online, and you probably already use the site for silly cat videos and shots people get hit with exercise balls. But YouTube has a great collection of feature-length movies in its free tier as well. In general, most of these B-list updates, but there are some quality movies hiding there. In addition to free, Google-curated movies, there are thousands of movies on the site that don't show up when you search directly for them. If you're looking for a specific title, especially an older one, it's worth using instant search on YouTube to see if anyone has posted it. Vimeo YouTube may be the biggest video-hosting site, but Vimeo is probably the best. Yes, they're fighting words, but Vimeo has muscles to back them up. The site has a clean layout with no ads and no benefits for the active user community, which is widely considered more professional and constructive than YouTube's. This community reveals many great original short and toy long movies. Vimeo is also an on-Demand section where users can buy full-length movies and TV shows. Most of them are independently produced by Vimeo users, but some offers are produced by major studios as well. Either way, Vimeo is a great place to find free, high quality movies. Roku Channel When Roku originally launched its free, ad-supported Roku Channel, it wasn't technically eligible for this roundup because you had to be one of the company's streaming media devices to see it. Roku devices certainly do not break the bank, but they are not free. Now, however, the Roku Channel is available to everyone, via the web, as well as through the company's free apps for iOS and Android. The service boasts more than 10,000 titles to choose from, including old favorites such as Sisterhood Of Travel Shorts and Donnie Darko, as well as a number of new and old TV series, from The Dick Van Dyke Show and The Enchanted Bachelorette. Before you check you must create a free Roku account, but it is a quick and painless process. If you ever decide to expand your options, Roku Channel is now home to several premium subscription options, including Showtime, Epix and Starz. Roku Channel is available in the U.S. and Canada. Plex Free Movies and TV Shows Plex is known for a versatile and easy way to manage and view your private collection of movies, music, photos and other media. In 2019, however, the company launched its own ad-supported free streaming service, which was studios such as MGM, Warner, Lionsgate and Legendary. It is available worldwide, although the choice of titles varies greatly from region to region. You can access the collection of movies and shows in your browser, or any large number of devices that support Plex client software, such as Apple TV, Roku, smart TVs, etc. All you need is a free Plex account and you're ready to go. Pluto TV currently features several live movie channels, perfect if you want to watch something but don't know what. There are two general-purpose film channels, with the rest focusing on specific genres or categories, including Action movies, Fury flicks, Horror 24/7, Classic Movies, Black Cinema, Gravitas Movies and The Asylum. The service works in the U.S., as well as in many international locations. Pluto's TV on-demand film collection is relatively small and rotates frequently, but offers as much variety as its live movie channels. There are also a ton of devices in addition to your computer, including Apple TV, Amazon Fire TV, Roku devices, and more. For more information about Pluto TV, see our full service guide. Tubi TV Another up-and-comer, Tubi is very similar to Sony Crackle because it offers both free movies and TV episodes. Whatever device you use, the options are pretty good, so you can watch Tub because it's available on Android, iOS, Roku, Apple TV, Amazon Fire TV, Samsung smart TDS, Sony smart TDS, PlayStation 4, Xbox One and the web. Like most services on this list, you need to look at some commercials, but that's what keeps the service free. Tubi has content with over 200 partners, including NBCUniversal and Warner Bros., which brings with it nearly 400 classic titles like Hell's Kitchen, Unsolved Secrets, 3rd Rock From the Sun and Real McCoy's, and the original version of 21 Jump Street. Hit movies like Kick-Ass, Fury and 13 Going on 30 are available, as well as cult classics like 30 Day Night, Donnie Darko and Boondock Saints. Cult classics like Assault on Precinct 13, Sleepaway Camp and C.H.U.D., along with soon-to-be cult classics like 10 Cloverfield Lane and No Country for Old Men, can also be found in the growing catalog. If you use this service to upgrade Netflix instead of replacing it, does the Netflix section will help you find new and interesting movies Independents and documentaries Kanopy Just like Hoopla, Kanopy is not only free to use, but it is also commercial-free if you have a library card. Originally founded in 2008 in Australia as an educational tool, Kanopy now offers a library of over 30,000 films through its partnership with more than 200 libraries. There is a great focus on independent free movies and documentaries (the company even has access to many recent films in the A24 catalog), but you'll find all kinds of movies available, and even more are on the way thanks to a deal that sees the entire catalog of filmmaker Fred Wiseman come to the service. Kanopy is available internationally, but content can vary from location to location. Top Documentary Love Documentaries? Our ska. You know what they say, the truth is stranger than fiction. The aptly titled Top Documentaries are, hands down, the best site for documentaries. Not every choice is the length of the movie, but a good documentary doesn't have to be long - some of the best are under the 60-minute mark. Boasting a library of more than 3,000 movies, the site also has a simple and simple design and categorizes all your movies based on the theme, making it easy to find something you're interested in right now. The content was not hosted by the site, but rather curated and embedded from other sites such as YouTube, Vimeo, Daily Motion, etc. It is available internationally, but not all content works in all locations. The sources of classic movies Archive.org chances are, you're reading this article because you're looking for a place to watch newly released movies online. While there's nothing wrong with that you certainly shouldn't ignore all the fantastic older movies the internet has to offer. Archive.org offers a real treasure trove of old movies you've probably never heard of, as well as the handful that you feel. The archive - which is also home to the famous Wayback Machine, which shows you how the internet used to be - is silent movies, black-and-white horror movies, obscure sci-fi movies and a selection of other movies. Retrovision Retrovision is another public site offering hundreds of classic movies from several different eras. The word classic may be up for interpretation - there are some movies here that were made as recently as last year, and not all Retrovision movies are of high quality - but there are still a lot of good things here. Retrovision is also a well-designed site that allows users to filter based on the genre. It is also not limited to feature-length films, as there is a strong collection of classic TV shows to choose from. Shocker Internet Drive-In Shocker Internet Drive-In is a bit niche, and its website looks like it was made in the '90s, but it's a great resource. The site will be updated weekly with featured horror classics, which will then be available for free to download WMV files from the website Snack Bar. The site has a fun little blast from the past, with weekly shows framed by a digital drive-in. Users can also purchase DVD copies of any movie on the website for just \$3. If you miss the old days of the internet, if it was more like the Wild West and everything was less polished, it might be for you. The downside of so many different services is that if you have a film in mind but don't know where to watch it, you have a lot of different directories to wade through the hopes of finding it. Fortunately, if you have a smartphone, you'll probably have access to a tool that will help you.
