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Texas window tint law

The percentage of light that a window tint film passes through your car windows is called the VLT (Visible Light Transmission) and each state has different legal limits. The amount of light allowed to pass through your film and glass in Texas is very specific to the state and is different for passenger cars and multi-purpose vehicles. A higher VLT means that more light can pass through the window film. Example: a 75% tint will allow 75% of the light to pass through, while a 5% tint will only pass 5% of the light, making the 5% tint a much darker film. What is the legal hue in Texas - Passenger Car Windscreen: 25% VLT tint is allowed above the manufacturer's AS-1 line or top 5 inches, with less than 25% reflection. Double side mirrors are only required when the rear window is tinted. Is colored tint illegal in Texas? All shade colors are allowed in Texas except for Red, Amber and Blue.What are the Window Tint Certification Rules in Texas? Film manufacturers must certify the film they sell in the state. Contact your dealer if they use certified foil. Do I need a certified sticker from the company that installs my window tint in Texas? The sticker to identify legal paints is required between the film & glass on the driver's side window. Are there any medical exemptions in Texas for Window Tint? Texas allows medical exemptions for special hue. For more information on the specific terms of the exemption, see Texas tint laws. Texas Window Tint Law Medical Exemption References Motorists can apply for a medical exemption from the Texas Department of Public Safety by submitting an application and a signed certificate or prescription from a licensed physician, ophthalmologist or optometrist. The declaration must state that it considers that the exemption is necessary to protect the health of the motorist. With medical waivers light transmission can be under 25% VLT on all windows except windshield. Untinted UV filter can be applied to the windshield, provided it does not reduce light transmission more than 5%. Every state in the United States has its own percentage of darkness and reflection that your car windows may have, as well as other specific regulations that you may need to know. Below, we list all relevant information regarding tinted windows in Texas. Window tint darkness The amount of light that can pass through your car windows is measured in percentages (called VLT), so make sure your coloring film is up to these standards! Texas window dyeing laws have different regulations for passengers and multipurpose vehicles, so make sure you read the laws carefully and check which ones apply to your vehicle. Texas window tint laws specify the following: Windshield can only top 5 inches tinted with 25% VLT. Front windows should pass more than 25% of the light in your car (25% VLT). Rear windows can have 25% VLT on passenger cars, or may not have darkness on MPV (bus, van, SUV, etc.; more info below). Rear window can have any darkness. Quick info: VLT stands for Visible Light Transmittance. 25% VLT means that 25% of the total light has to pass through windows, or no more than 75% of the total light can be blocked. Passenger cars and MPV – Multi-Purpose Vehicles have different limitations for the tint of the side window. If you have any doubts about your vehicle type, you will find a federal ID label located on the door frame next to the driver's seat. Sources: Window tint reflection Some tinting film can reflect incoming light, thus further reducing glare and heat. Texas allows the use of dyeing foil with a mirrored or metallic above 25% for all windows. Side mirrors If the rear window of your car is tinted, you must have double side mirrors on your vehicle. In case you do not have a double double rearview mirrors, you may only tint rear window up to 25% VLT. Texas' limited tinted window tint laws limit the color of tinted windows. It is not legal to use colors red, blue or amber. Medical exemptions Some U.S. states allow different window tint rates due to certain medical conditions. In the case of medical conditions such as porphyria, xeroderma pigmentosa, or severe drug light sensitivity, you apply to use darker window film. With medical exceptions, Texas stands up to 5% window tint on as-1 line windshield (top 5 inches), or a shade of darkness on other windows. Medical exception certificate is issued by Texas Department of Public Safety, and driver or other exempt passenger must always hold the certificate while the vehicle is in operation. See: Medical Exemption Request (.pdf file). Other privacy devices Texas tint laws allow the use of curtains, blinds, curtains, or other similar window coverings only on the back windows. Window film certificate All window tonton manufacturers must certify their products with the Texas Department of Public Safety. Each tinted window shall be labelled with a legible label between

tinted foil and glass. This label must contain the name and registration number of the manufacturer and a declaration that complies with the Texas Transportation Code §547.609. At the very least, the installers of the window tint should apply the label between the sunscreen and the lower rear corner of the driver's left side window. This label must be clearly visible and legible from outside the vehicle. Some cities or counties in Texas may have their own special regulations on window dyeing, so if you're unsure about anything you should contact your local law enforcement or DMV offices.
