The book tells the story of two sisters in France during World War II and their struggle to survive and resist german occupation of France. It was inspired by the story of a Belgian woman, Andrée de Jongh, who helped Allied pilots flee the Nazi territory. [1] [2] To date, Nightingale has sold more than 2 million copies and has been published in 43 languages. [3] The novel also earned places on several bestseller lists, and was selected by TriStar Pictures in March 2015 when Melanie Laurent was signed to direct the film. [3] Synopsis The book uses the written device of a frame story; the frame is presented as a first-person narration in memory of an elderly woman in 1995, whose name is not initially disclosed to the reader. All we know is that he has a son named Julien and lives off the coast of Oregon. However, the main activity of the book is told in the third person after two sisters, Vianne Mauriac and Isabelle Rossignol, who live in France around 1939 on the eve of The Second World War. The sisters are estranged from each other and from their father, and the book follows their two different paths. Vianne, the eldest sister, is a married teacher who raises her 8-year-old daughter Sophie in her childhood home called Le Jardin in the town of Carriveau. Vianne's husband Antoine has been recruited and subsequently imprisoned as a prisoner of war. At home, Vianne survives the fact that the Germans have occupied France since the Battle of France, struggled to keep themselves and their daughters alive in the face of poor food rations, the dwindling francs left behind by Antoine, the Wehrmacht and SS officers in their homes, the loss of their jobs and the growing reins of the city's Jews. The first officer to be at home is Wolfgang Beck, a kind man with a family he has left behind. One is Von Richter, a more sadistic officer who using Vianne for physical and sexual abuse. Later in the novel, when Vianne's best friend Rachel de Champlain is deported to a concentration camp, she adopts Rachel's three-year-old son, Ari, and renames her Daniel to hide his Jewish identity. Isabelle, a younger and more ardent sister, decides to take an active role in opposing the occupation. After being expelled from school, he travels from Paris to Carriveau on foot and meets a young rebel named Gaëtan Dubois along the way. In Carriveau, he joins the French Resistance and is initially tasked with distributing anti-Nazi propaganda. After moving to a cell in Paris, he develops a plan to help Allied airmen flee to the British Embassy in neutral Spain, where they can be repatriated. He has thrived, and with the support of other actors in the resistance (including his father, with whom he is starting to build a relationship) and British MI9, this will become his primary task throughout the war. He deserves the code name Nightingale, and the Nazis are actively hunting him. He is eventually imprisoned, and when his father falsely confesses to being Nightingale to save him, he is sent to a concentration camp in Germany. Inspiration Nightingale's characters themselves are not real people, although some of their actions are based on real historical figures. Isabelle's escape route over allied airmen who crashed over the Pyrenees was based on the comet line of 24-year-old Andrée de Jongh, a Belgian woman who helped pilots and others escape. [4] Just like Isabelle, de Jongh personally escorted many across the Pyrenees on foot; By the end of the war, he had assisted 118 airmen. Like Isabelle, de Jongh was captured at the end of the war and sent to the Ravensbrück concentration camp instead of executed because the Nazis did not believe his claim that he himself was the organizer of the route. However, de Jongh lived long after the war, became countess in 1985 and finally died in 2007, while in the novel Isabelle dies shortly after being released from the camp. De Jongh's story also inspired Hannah to conduct further research and, during the French Resistance, found stories of women willing to risk their lives and children to protect Jewish families; This became the inspiration for the faulty character in the book.
