The main industries in Washington state include agriculture, timber, tourism, hydroelectric power, computer software, aircraft, and aluminum refining. Of these, agriculture is the most important industry, accounting for \$9.5 billion in the state economy. Apples, dairy products, beef, wheat and potatoes are the top five agricultural products in Washington. Milk is the most common dairy product, accounting for about 15 percent of total agricultural receipts. The animals also provide beef, both from cattle and calves, as well as chicken eggs, and chicken meat. Apples are one of the largest crops grown in Washington, accounting for about 20 percent of the state's agricultural revenues. Washington produces more apples than any other state, accounting for 64 percent of the country's supply applies. Whether you want to go hiking or camping, stay in a cabin, go out on the water, sit on a beach, or have an outdoor birthday party or family reunion, state parks have it all. You can even delve into local history as several state parks have historic buildings from past military installations or schools. Note that state parks require a Discover Pass to park, which costs \$30 for an annual permit and \$10 for a day-to-day usability permit Many parks, but not all, feature stations where you can buy a permit, or you can buy one online before you leave. 01 of 13 Beacon Rock State Park is the 848-foot Beacon Rock, which you can venture to the top of the route through the switchback and enjoy stellar views. The park is also perfect for hiking to waterfalls (there are tons and tons of waterfalls in the Gorge, including Multnomah Falls, which is not too far away), climbing, cycling, or horse riding.
