Did you identify all these linking verbs? In addition to using the worksheet specified here, consider supplementing your predictive lesson plan with some other review activities. Distribute a spreadsheet of phrases like those mentioned above, and have students circle the verb and emphasize the predicate. Reviewing answers in class can help promote group activity and collaboration. Distribute a worksheet with missing words. Some sentences should be missing the noun, others are missing the verb, and even other predicate the adjective. Invite students to fill in the fields with an appropriate word and share answers with the class. For younger students, a more visually oriented spreadsheet would be more appropriate and effective. Write whole sentences on one side, coordinating images on the other. Invite students to link the picture to the correct sentences by drawing a line. Invite students to read the sentences for a sense of the words.
