[8] Melody Maker, by contrast, wrote that while ambitious and courageous, Broken Frame - as its title suggests - marks the end of a beautiful dream, a commentary on the departure of the lead composer Clarke. Reviewer Steve Sutherland considered the songs to be silly desires for art, the musical and thematic thefts of the album sounded like puerile infatuations papering over anonymity. At the same time, Sutherland acknowledged that the group's increasing complexity sounds less the result of external persuasion than an understandable, natural evolution, although he eventually concluded that Depeche Mode remained (unlike the new Clarke Yazoo group) essentially unakusive. [11] Noise comments! the magazine's DH (most likely Noise! contributor Dave Henderson) showed a more clear vetting. DH said the album falls into itself well and shows we can expect a lot more from a clean cut quartet, adding: [and] t times reaches high points far beyond their first album. [12] In a retrospective review for AllMusic, Ned Raggett described Broken Frame as a significantly more ambitious endeavor than a pure pop/disco debut band, with much of the album forsaking earlier sprightliness... for more melancholic reflections on love gone wrong. He added: More complex arrangements and side-by-side sounds, such as the spark of breaking glass in 'Leave in Silence', help give this underrated album even more interesting, unexpected edges. [1] In 1990, when he was promoting his album Violator, composer Martin Gore lamented parts of the album, saying, I regret all the ill things from the beginning... musically Broken Frame was mish-mash. [13] The cover image Despite the fact that it is a photograph, the cover drawing is intended to resemble an image. It depicts a woman cutting grain in an East Anglian field near Duxford, Cambridgeshire. It was taken by Brian Griffin (who previously took cover photography for Speak & Spell and print photography for the band) using a mixture of natural and artificial lighting. Griffin cited the socialist realism of Soviet Russia as inspiration, notably the work of Kazimir Malevich, and German Romanticism. [14] Griffin discovered a gallery of alternative images from the same image on his website. [16] Later releases of the album on vinyl (2007) and compact disc (2009) have slightly different shots. While the reviewer for Release Magazine wrote that this version was nothing major but well done, other reviews were more detailed. [27] The Electricity Club found influence and one on the cover of The Sun & the Rainfall and concluded that Marsheaux had used unconventional sounds and vocals to create the recording. [28] Reviews from Germany found that Marsheaux had developed the assets and disadvantages of the original edition. According to the Westdeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, the cheesy sides of depeche mode's early album were deliberately revealed in tracks like The Meaning of Love, while Sonic Seducer praised Marsheaux's darker and slower interpretation of the song.
