You can also get your permission for beginners, which allows you to enter the official driving school SCCA. Get a license. Some forms of racing require you to hold an SCCA competition license. You can get one from SCCA Regional Driving School. To enter the SCCA driving school, you must have a race-ready car. Your pit crew consists of your crew chief, mechanics and tire specialists. Not all forms of racing require pit crews, but having a team on hand come race day can help you put an edge. Spare parts. If something goes wrong on or off the track, you don't want to be scrambling to find what you need. Bring with you a spare set of tyres, brake boards, vlets and light bulbs, radiator hoses and motor belts to keep you safe. Fuel. Private tracks charge membership fees, some offer unlimited access to the track, but fees typically start at \$6,000 a year.
