Turner, the ice rink manager for Broadmoor Ice Palace and a former semi-professional goalkeeper was hired as the team's first coach, and the Pioneers struck a blow for their first game in December, losing to the University of Saskatchewan, 17-0. Denver would surprisingly lose the first nine games before recording their
first win against Wyoming on January 27. The following season saw many improvements with the team, which finished with a record 11-11-1 and when Turner resigned after the year in which he gave Neil Celley the opportunity to build the program. When Celley took the reins, he was the youngest head coach in the
history of ice hockey at 24[2] and won a national title with Michigan the year before as a player, [3] The team responded to Celley by raising his record to 18-6-1 and finishing second in the mCHL's inaugural standings. Unfortunately, Celley's old team was selected ahead of Denver for the FCAA tournament thanks to a
better overall record. The pioneers would continue to play well under Celley, but their winning percentage fell every year until 1956, when they finished just one hair above 0,500. Celley resigned after that season and handed over the team to former NHLer Murray Armstrong. Armstrong was Armstrong came to DU and
secured an NBAA title within three years, and did it in his second year. The team, using the Armstrong coaching pipeline to ex-junior players in Canada, took a year to go, but by 1958 the DU team had started shooting on all cylinders. Denver won his first conference title (equaling North Dakota) and received his second
Western seed for his first NBAA tournament bid. Denver didn't let the bright lights stun them as they went through the competition, winning both games 6-2 and taking their first NBAA national title in Minneapolis. The following season, an argument between conference members on the recruitment of Canadian players
who played junior hockey, caused THE WIHL to collapse and left Denver without a conference. [4] Denver struggled to complete its program, and although DU finished with the best record of any Western team (22–5–1), their competition was so petty that the Pioneers were passed to North Dakota (who took three of the
four matches between them) for the BCAA tournament with big ten champion Michigan State receiving the other offer. After this disaster, all teams that were in the WIHL resumed the conference under a new name (WCHA) and instituted a playoff among other reforms. As the recruitment issue remained unchanged,
Denver was able to make the most of it and build their program into the dominant power over the decade. Early 1960s Denver began its first season WCHA by winning the regular season title and being WCHA tournament co-champions, along with Michigan Tech. to take advantage of the NBAA bidding policy, which
would give automatic bids to tournament champions and because there was no western conference rival WCHA could guarantee that both its co-champions would make four frozen. Denver won both OFA games and won the national title in 1960. The MOP tournament was first split that year and while being given to
three separate players, none of them wore Denver sweaters. The pioneers followed the second championship, dominating the competition strongly in 1961. In what is usually ranked among the best seasons ever, [5] the team started with five wins before dropping a game at Michigan Tech on the road and then did not
lose another game. The '61 pioneers scored 242 times in just 32 contests for a rate of just over 7.5 goals per game. In addition, they allowed only 59 goals conceded at the time (1.84). Although none of the brands have been registered, the average scoring difference of +5.72 is still an BCAA record. Denver had the
second and third leading scoring in the nation, who were just topped by Phil Latreille scoring an ALL-time NBAA record of 80 goals in 21 games. Not only have the Pioneers posted the first season of 30 wins in THE history of the NCAA, but, playing in every game, George Kirkwood set an NBAA record for wins in a
season (30). Denver made sure they also did their damage when they counted the most; in the four playoff games they played (2 conferences, 2 NCAA) The pioneers each won with at least 5 goals and won all four matches with a total of 35-6. In the NBAA championship game against St. Lawrence Denver handed over
the first goal, but ended the night by marking the nine final (an NBAA record) and won the game by 10 goals, 12-2 (also an NBAA record to 13 in the championship game. [6] Denver equalled the record by placing 5 players in the All-Tournament Team[7] and set the 5-player
record in the All-WCHA First Team[8] as well as the ALL-American AHCA[9] team and won all five individual awards offered that year. Three of the players in that team eventually played in the NHL, a rare event for the NCAA teams at the time. [10] After such unrivalled dominance, Denver was expected to decline the
following year, especially as many of the players graduated, but the team finished third in WCHA. A year later, they won both WCHA conference titles and again made the NMAa tournament. After Clarkson's fall in a relatively easy 6-2 semi-final match Denver faced off against north Dakota for a rematch of her first title in
1958. Sioux Fighting scored three times before eight minutes and, while Denver responded with two guick goals, North Dakota ticked off in the first match, with a 5-2 advantage. When they added another five minutes the second it looked like they were going to go to a national title. National. The pioneers gave up and
scored twice to reduce the advantage in half by going into the third. The North Dakota closed the ranks and set up a wall in front of Rudy Unis in the final frame, but still couldn't stop Denver from scoring, however, the Pioneers could just notch a goal and lost their first NBAA tournament game, 5-6. [11] The team's seven
consecutive tournament wins series from the start is still an NBAA record. Denver followed this disappointment over Michigan. In the tournament the FCAA DU produced a very similar result to the previous year by dropping
their semi-final opponent easily, then allowing the team they defeated in the WCHA championship to score the first three goals. This time it was the Wolverines who would take the title and send the Pioneers home disappointed. [12] The following season Denver finished with a record of 18-8-2, one of the best in the
country, but because they played only 12 conference games and won only 4 games they finished 6th in the WCHA and were left out of the play-offs of the conference. The following season Denver increased their conference schedule to 20 games, but because WCHA added Minnesota-Duluth as a member, the
conference tournament has now included all 8 teams. Denver was given a regional matchup against the game easily to give them a chance against arch-nemesis North Dakota for an entry to the NBAA tournament. Despite the fact that the smaller seeds the game was played in
the denver home stadium due, in part, to a terrible blizzard that dropped more than two meters around grand forks. [13] The home game may have given Denver a sufficient advantage, and the Pioneers made it 5-4 in overtime to return to the NBAA tournament. Once there Denver faced Clarkson for the third time in the
semifinals, but the Golden Knights were able to avenge their losses early and send DU to his first consolation game. Although they won the match, the Pioneers and their fans were far from happy with the result. The following season Denver rose to 2nd place in the conference, but because the WCHA tournament was
still rigged for regional matchups the pioneers had to play top seeds North Dakota in the second round and Sioux Fighting were able to redeem themselves with a win. Late '60s While many programs may have been happy with Denver's results achieved in '66 and '67 Pioneers were decided nonplussed. When the team
started the 1968 season slowly, losing three of the first five games, they were taken to task and responded by winning every remaining game except for a stretch at the end of December, when they played four Olympic teams. Denver's done above WCHA and with regional restrictions removed were able to make the
most of their top seeds and demolish their 27-7 competition in Games. In the NCAA tournament Denver faced Boston College for the first time[14] and pushed the Eagles away with a 4-1 win despite the sloppy play. The final brought the North Dakota and DU together for a rubber match and the two teams fought a tough
defensive battle through two open periods before the flood and Denver scored four times in the final while Gerry Powers won the first shutout in a championship game. [2] The following season was pretty much the same; after a slow start the Pioneers ran through most of their competition, finishing second in WCHA and
taking down the much weaker opponents in the conference tournament to return to the NBAA playoff. For this 1969 championship they dissected Harvard 9-2 in the opening game before facing Ken Dryden-led Cornell. The pioneers had no trouble scoring against the seemingly impenetrable Big Red defense, building
leads three times while the final one blocked and Denver won its fifth NATIONAL NBAA title, 4-3. Dynasty's end Despite losing many players from the national dual title teams due to denver gradations did not lose much leg and finished second in WCHA, but lost to wisconsin's new entry in the conference tournament.
Next season, Denver finished second for the third consecutive year and were able to win another league co-championship and receive the top seed of the west. The pioneers had to settle for a third-place NCAA finish after losing only the second semi-final game in nine opportunities. The following season, Denver won
both conference titles for the fifth time in their history, but was stunned by a 2-7 semi-final defeat, the team to play most of their nore than six years. [2] As their recent tournament had collapsed with a concrete symbol, the roof of the DU Arena failed in 1972 and forced the team to play most of their
remaining home games at the Denver Coliseum. [15] While the pioneers managed to overcome this difficulty and win WCHA once again and finish as the near runner-up was a battle on the ice that ultimately cost them dearly. Armstrong's decline assistant Marshall Johnston took over and the team jumped up the standings as the top-
ranked nation team, winning the WCHA regular season crown and breaking the school record for wins with 33 (albeit in 40 games), but DU was stopped in the second round of the WCA by an upstart Colorado College team after learning that the denver's appeal to be eligible for the 1978 NCAA tournament was turned
down by the NCA. After falling to sixth place the following season. Denver ended 1979-80 last dead in WCHA and missed the playoffs in full. The team returned to the NHL and the program was given to a third professional, Ralph Backstrom. Backstrom's entry
coincided with the fact that four WCHA members left the conference with only six schools. The co-championship format was eliminated and although Denver offered a look of hope in Backstrom's first season, the team slipped to the bottom of the division for three seasons. By the end of the 1984–85 season Denver had
lost eight consecutive playoff games and was in danger of becoming a future thought in WCHA. The 1985-86 team provided a surprising start to the next campaign, winning seven of their first eight-game on their way to the wcha regular season and playoff championships over Michigan Tech, Minnesota-Duluth and

Penrose Award. The highlights were short-lived, however and over the next four years Denver returned to being a middling team in WCHA. Backstrom left in 1990 and was replaced by Frank Serratore. While he would later achieve great success with Air Force Serratore time in Denver it was the darkest period in the
program's history. In its first season, the Pioneers won only six games, losing a school record of 30 out of 38 matches. The following season brought only marginal improvements, but when the team grew above 0,500 in 1992-1993 it seemed that Serratore's job could be saved, but after slipping back to ninth place in a
year after he was coached and replaced by Wisconsin's George Gwozdecky. Gwozdecky. It was when Denver hired Gwozdecky they hoped they were getting the same coach who won the back-to-back CCHA Coach of the Year awards and in his first season he delivered by getting the pioneers to win 10 more games
than they had the year before and jump from 9 in conference to a tie for second place. After a disappointing loss to the opening round in the WCHA playoffs the following year Denver finally returned to the NBAA tournament in 1997 and beat a very strong Vermont team in the first round. In 1999, the Pioneers were able to
a dominant North Dakota to take their first championship conference in thirteen years, but lost their first NBAA tournament game to Michigan in the first meeting between the two since The Wolverines left WCHA. [16] Denver stumbled over the next two years before winning their first WCHA regular season title under
Gwozdecky, as well as a second conference championship. Unfortunately, the pioneers found themselves pitted against Michigan in the first round of the WCHA tournament each of the next two years, but their record in 2004 was good enough to get
them a #2 seed despite the loss. [17] Du managed to defeat Gwozdecky's previous team, Miami, in a tight match before advancing to face North Dakota in the Fioneers 23-13 in the first two periods, but Sioux Fighting couldn't get
the last puck Adam Berkhoel. The two teams were left without scores until just 2:29 left in regulation when Luke Fulgham deflected a puck into the net and sent the Pioneers into four ice creams for the first time in 18 years. [18] Denver met Minnesota-Duluth in the semifinals and looked outof when the Bulldogs scored

The pioneers, however, were not deterred and came out shooting in the third, tying the score in less than four minutes and adding two more
goals before the period was half over. Duluth was so stunned by the comeback that they could only use 6 shots during the time Denver took the game to make their appearance released in 1973. [19] With Tomorrow as the only obstacle left in their path, Denver put ahead of Adam
Berkhoel and allowed only 24 shots to reach the goalkeeper, including none during a 6-to-3 power play in the last minute and a half of the game. Berkhoel won, a goal scored by Gabe Gauthier in the first as the winner. [20] After having their first title in 35 years Denver lifted its game, tying the Colorado College to the
WCHA crown and producing #2 offensive in the country. Country. WCHA tournament, however, was their defense that led the way. With rookie goalkeeper Peter Manlino standing on his head for two shutouts, the Pioneers allowed only two goals in four games, winning three games with one goal to take the
championship. DU won #2 overall seed and had to survive a scare from Bemidji State in their first game. After allowing 3 to the Castors much weaker, Glenn Fisher was on the bench in favor of Maninino for the remaining three games and the Pioneers cruise to the championship game with 4-2 and 6-2 wins. In the

1976 0 University of Denver Arena (DU Arena) was a 5,237-seat multi-purpose arena in Denver. In addition to serving as home ice rink pioneers, it has hosted several Frozen Fours. It was destroyed in 1997 to make way for the $75 million Magness Arena, (part of the Ritchie Center for Sports and Wellness), which
opened in 1999. Originally a naval drilling hall built during World War II in Farragut, Idaho, ARENA DU was donated to the University's then new ice hockey program. The arena was in 1972-1973, when the roof needed repair and
14 seven-tonne steel farms were added to cover the roof. Additional renovations were added in the 1990s, before destroying in 1997. The most famous features of the arena were the steep balcony of the grandstand at the southern end, and the rainbow of the 1970s painted on the north wall. The famous hockey games
that took place there include the NBAA ice hockey finals in 1961, 1964 and 1976. Magness Arena (1999–present) Magness Arena is a 7,200-seat multicolored sports arena in Denver, Colorado. It was built between 1997 and 1999 as part of the Daniel L. Ritchie Sports & amp; Wellness sports complex, an $84 million,
$400,000 square (37,000 m2) sports complex at the University of Denver. It is home to the University of Denver Pioneers ice hockey and basketball teams. Ritchie Center replaced the former DU Arena and DU Fieldhouse, which were destroyed in 1997 to make way for Ritchie Center. The basketball team also plays
smaller games at Hamilton Gymnasium, located in Ritchie Center. The arena is named after cable television pioneer Bob Magness, who donated $10 million for construction costs. Other Colorado Arenas When the roof du Arena was fixed between 1972 and 1973, the Pioneers played home games at the Denver
Coliseum. When magness arena was under construction from 1997 to 1999, Denver played home games at four different arenas around the state: Denver Coliseum, McNichols Arena, Colorado Springs World Arena and at Air Force Academy's Cadet Ice Arena. DU also played a 2012 home exhibition game at Denver
Pepsi Center against the University of British Columbia. Denver's all-time hockey record crowd was the 2016 regular season outdoor NCHC game against Colorado College, called the Battle of Blake before over 35,000 fans at the Denver Coors Field baseball stadium, most fans to ever see a HOME DU sporting event in
