Generally speaking, a subject is who or what is a phrase. Almost anything can be a subject. In the sentences below the subjects are underlined: Nicolas Cage is an actor. Greece is a beautiful country. Julio, Rafael and I went to the store. Your health is very important. Swimming and cycling are fun activities. Subjects usually come at the beginning of a sentence, but they don't have to. What is a Subject Pronoun? A pronoun is a shorter word that takes the place of a longer noun. We use pronouns as soon as we introduce a noun so we don't have to repeat the same thing over and over again. Here are some sentences in which the subjects were replaced by subject pronouns. He's an actor. It's a beautiful country. We went to the store. It's very important. They're fun activities. The subject pronouns in English are me, you, him, her, this, us and them. It can be beneficial to organize them into a chart based on the number (how many people or things there are) and person (whether you are talking about yourself, to someone else, or about another person). singular: plural: first person: I us second person: I us second person: you third person: he, she, they realize that there is no distinction in English between the singular you and the plural you. Although it is not considered proper grammar, many people will use you or you to indicate that you are talking to more than one person. It is also worth noting that he and she are the only pronouns that take into account the genre. Pronouns of Spanish subject The pronoun of subject in Spanish is like this; singular; plural; first person; yo nosotros, vosotras second person; tú vosotros, vosotras third person; yo nosotros, vosotras third person; ellas Note that there is no pronoun subject to him in Spanish. How do you say that? See below. Yo to say I in Spanish, say yo. Yo is not capitalized unless you start a sentence: Yo hablo español. I speak Spanish. Luckily yo hablo español. Fortunately, I speak Spanish, say tú. Tú can only be singular; you can't use tú to address a group of people. Also, the accent on u is not optional; you (without the accent) means yours and not you. (The words tu and you are pronounced in the same way.) Tú hablas español. You speak Spanish, let's say it in Spanish, let's say it in Spanish, say ella. Remember that the II is pronounced as a y. Generally speaking, you should use tu when you are addressing someone with whom you have an informal relationship such as a friend, colleague, or close family member. Use usted when addressing someone with whom you have a more respectful relationship like an elder, a boss or a dignitary. For example: talking to a child: talking to a teacher: Tú escribes bien. You write well. Usted bien escribe. You write well. A good rule of rule to use is the of the first name, you can them as tú. If you don't address someone as tú: tutear. Different countries have different rules for the use of tú vs. usted. While some people may find his use of tú captivating, others may find it offensive. In doubt, use usted. It's better to address someone as expelled when you expect te than the other way around. The word usted is commonly abbreviated Ud. (note the capital letter). Vosotros or Ustedes? When approaching a group of people, vosotros are used for unusual situations and ustedes are used in situations where more respect is needed. For example: talk to a group of children: talk to several teachers: Vosotros escribés bien. You write well. Ustedes escriben bien. You write well. Ustedes escriben bien. You write well.
