It is common for many people to attach a TV with a DVD player to a car. The next level is the installation of the game system. There is no standard way to install it, but it is possible. When your car has a TV, you can load your PlayStation or Wii into the car and enjoy the games you play on the go. The most important thing is to find a safe place for the gaming system in the car and a way to connect its power supply to the electrical system. If you don't have a TV, attach it to your car. The TV must have an input port that works on the game console. In most cases, use an RCA composite plug. Most car TVs go into the seat headrest. Drill a hole in the back of the headrest and place the TV frame in it. Install the game console in a safe place. If there is enough clearance, the bottom of the passenger seat is good. It can also be attached to a dashboard if it is not in the driver's sight or in the way of the airbag. The adhesive Velcro strip holds it in place. If no one else, try storing it in the glove compartment. Use the RCA cable to connect the console to the TV. If the TV is in the seat headrest, route the cable through the upholstery of the seat. This is great if the body is under the seat. If it is on the front, wire a long enough cable under the seat and go through the upholstery. Connect the power adapter of the main unit to the car's electrical system with a DC inverter. Place the inverter in the corner of the passenger's floorboards and plug it into the cigarette adapter. Run the main unit power cord from under the seat (or at the end of the dashboard) and plug it into the inverter. Store your system's games and controllers in a secure container.
