When the public thinks of elite warriors, it's often the Navy SEALs that come to mind. Their name is an acronym of Sea, Air and Land, indicating their ability to go where they are needed to complete their mission. SEALs and their predecessors have been involved in major conflicts around the world since The Second World War and therefore have a long and colourful organizational history. One of their most famous take-downs was Osama Bin Laden, the most wanted man in the world, so it's clear that their reputation is growing. There were a number of specialized maritime command units active in World War II that were a precursor to the modern SEALs. The Office of Strategic Services (OSS), a predecessor to the CIA, had a maritime department tasked with infiltrating clandestine agents and supplying resistance groups by sea, as well as carrying out maritime sabotage. Amphibious Scouts and Raiders teams were created to reconnoiter future landing beaches. They also led attacks to the right beaches and had a central role in North Africa and D-Day landings. The Naval Combat Demolitions Units (NCDUs) were trained in the demolition of submerged beach obstacles and were awarded the Presidential Unit Citation for their actions on Normandy.In the Pacific Theater, coral reefs were found to be the biggest obstacle to safe beach landings, and the Underwater Demolitions Teams (UDTs) were established to help amphibious landing land land safely. New types of missions include coastal raids at night to destroy railway tunnels and bridges. By the end of the conflict, the UDTs had expanded their mission capabilities, including intelligence gathering, munitions clearance and carrying out raids, to their traditional reconnaissance and obstacle approval tasks. Some people have seen this as the official birth of the SEALs, but it was really formalizing an ongoing process. The concept of a naval guerrilla force with sea, air and land capacity was outlined in March of that year and the first two SEAL units were formally established in 1962. ysbrandcosijn/ Getty Images Although the first SEAL missions were in communist Cuba, the war they fought Vietnam. Originally sent to train South Vietnamese troops in the same methods they used, SEAL teams quickly began to be used for covert operations. Their anti-guerrilla tactics were effective in the war to the enemy and their camouflage paint saw them called the men with green faces by the Viet Cong. Although they operated mainly from boats, they also developed air raid operations of helicopters in Vietnam. yotrak/Getty Images While many SEAL missions remain secret, the teams have seen action in almost every conflict the United States has been involved in, including Panama, Grenada, Bosnia and Somalia. The SEALs have undertaken a number of rescue operations, including the release of the cruise ship Achille Lauro from terrorists. Since then, rescued hostages in Yemen, Afghanistan and Somalia. In recent years, they have been involved in the counter-uprising in the Middle East. U.S. Navy/Getty Images Training to become a SEAL includes the Basic Underwater Demolitions/SEAL training, or BUD/S. It's a seven-month course that has three phases: conditioning, diving and land warfare. The most infamous period of training is Hell Week, five days designed to push candidates beyond their mental and physical limits. An estimated 75 percent of all candidates drop out of training. For those who succeed, follow parachute training and SEAL Qualification Training before finally being accepted into the SEALs. Charles Ommanney/Getty Images Sailors who complete BUD/S and SEAL Qualification Training are designated SEALs and receive the Special Warfare insignia for their uniform. Better known as the SEAL Trident, this gold insignia is worn on the chest and is one of the most recognizable of all navy insignia. The trident is also the only insignia that is the same for officers and recruited men, which is partly due to their combined training during BUD/S. The role that Navy SEAL navy Play revolves around getting in and out quickly and without being seen, gathering intelligence, destroying targets, and performing rescues, among other things. U.S. Special Operations Forces, which includes elite commando troops from every branch of the military such as the Navy SEALs, Army Rangers, Green Berets, and others have become critical to many U.S. military successes over the past decade. Each branch of the army has its own specially trained teams that can work in any situation and perform whatever task it needs to get the job done. What does it take to become a Navy SEAL? Even SEAL instructors can't predict who will make it at all. The common property instructors see in future SEALs can't really be defined, they just call it fire in the gut. You either have it or you don't. This article shows how Navy SEALs work and what they do, the amazing determination needed to become a SEAL, the very varied skills they need and the types of equipment they use on missions. The SEAL acronym stands for Sea, Air and Land, which identifies the elements in which they operate. SEALs work in small units - often one to two men, but sometimes in a platoon consists of up to 16. They are trained to perform specific tasks under any type of conditions and in any environment. Their training takes place in the desert, the jungle, in extremely hot and cold weather, and in urban areas. SEAL missions require detailed planning and precise execution. SEALs are trained to carry out missions that fall into five main categories: Unconventional Warfare (UW) - Using guerrilla warfare tactics in combat. Guerilla warfare is characterized by small, mobile battle groups that operate using often unorthodox combat methods such as destroying enemy stocks, creating diversions, ambushing small enemy units, destruction, and other hit and run types of operations. Foreign Internal Defense (FID) - Training given to foreigners to build relationships. During Operation Desert Storm, Navy SEALs trained 13 Kuwaiti operators in maritime infiltration techniques to set up a secret meeting with local resistance contacts in Iraq-occupied Kuwait City. Direct Action (DA) - Move against an enemy target. This can include attacks on land- or water-based targets, hostage rescues, ambushes, etc. Counter-terrorism (CT) - Includes direct action against terrorist operations, anti-terrorist actions to prevent terrorist acts, and the protection of civilians and troops. Special Reconnaissance (SR) - Includes conducting preliminary surveys to gather, staffing information and other forms of surveillance, both open and heim, where the purpose is to gather information. This may include collecting hydrographic data (beach and water research) for landings or tracking an enemy unit and reporting its position. When SEALs are not deployed, implemented, in constant training, both to hone basic skills and to learn new skills and techniques that will make a difference when deployed. The above categories overlap when it comes to actual missions, but these are the basis of SEAL training: to be experts in the skills needed to perform these different tasks. Tasks.
