Believe it or not, there is a right way and the wrong way to cheer at a football match. Basically, it is a set of unwritten rules that govern what is considered correct and what is not. You'll find them below with short explanations. Difficulty: Easy time is required: an hour and a half arrive early, so the squad can adjust and go for any new cheers. The Patriots, who were hosting the game, got some blame for the underinflation. The issue even sparked controversy called Deflategate, and quarterback Tom Brady eventually got a four-game suspension because the NFL found that Brady may have known about the underinflation. The game continues until one team is ahead at the end of overtime.
