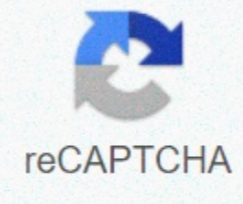

The Dolly Gray Children's Literature Award recognizes authors, illustrators and publishers of high-quality fictional and biographical children, intermediate and young adult books that authentically depict people with intellectual disabilities, such as autism spectrum disorders, intellectual disabilities and Down's syndrome. The award is a collaboration between members of the Department of Autism and Intellectual Disability (DADD), from the Council for Exceptional Children (CEC). Each year, an award is awarded to an author and illustrator (if applicable) of a children's book, an intermediate and/or young adult book containing appropriate depictions of people with intellectual disabilities. The impact of the Dolly Gray Children's Literature Award The Dolly Gray Children's Literature Award makes an impact on the public's recognition of the positive community contributions of people with intellectual disabilities, greater understanding and acceptance of teachers and school-aged peers by students with intellectual disabilities, and encouragement from writers and illustrators to publish quality literature, including grades with intellectual disabilities. This award is made possible through dedicated work and creative insight of many individuals.
