If you have a VW Jetta, replacing the radiator is a pretty difficult project because you have to remove so many parts and components of the engine. However, if you have to know mechanically how, you may want to get to grips with the job. Here's how to replace the radiator in 1998 and the later VW Jetta model. For many TDI owners, however, this is just an average. Volkswagen runs a program called TDI Tank Wars in which TDI drivers compete for the best mileage figures. Leaders claim to have achieved 90 miles per gallon or better, and mileage in the range of 60 to 70 mpg is common. You may not reach these figures in your daily commute, but with attention to detail and careful driving you can save a lot of money on fuel costs. Keep the engine tuned according to the Jett owner's manual. Change the oil regularly and make sure your oil, air and fuel filters are replaced as scheduled. Keep tyres inflated to the recommended pressure; this is usually located on the side of the tyre. Change driving habits to improve mileage; this will have a greater impact on fuel economy than any other factor. Above all, watch your speed. The Department of Energy estimates that reducing speed from 65 to 55 miles per hour can improve your car's mileage by 15%. Avoid jackrabbit starts and abrupt stops. When approaching a red light, take your foot off the accelerator and coast; if the light changes, you can avoid a full stop. If your car has a manual transmission, move as soon as possible so that the engine does not turn too much and remain in the upper gear as much as possible. Use cruise control whenever you can. Plan trips to avoid congestiond areas, excessive stops, or signs of stops and hills. Combine tasks to reduce the number of trips you travel to. Remove excess cargo. Minimize external resistance on the car by removing unconfirmed roof racks and keeping windows and roofs closed whenever possible. Avoid idling; switch off the engine while waiting in long lines such as bridge openings or railway crossings. Track mileage when buying fuel from certain stations; quality of diesel fuel can vary considerably between different suppliers. Recording mileage with each refueling can help you develop a high-mileage mindset, improving awareness of all the factors that affect your car's fuel economy. It first went on sale in the 1990s, joining a very limited number of diesel models from European automakers available in America. Jetta TDI is known for its excellent fuel economy and overall quality, but there are several well-known issues drivers and potential owners should be aware of. One of the problems with some Jetta TDIs is the difficulty of starting the engine, or the engine that will not start at all. This can happen for several reasons, but in many cases it is associated with luminous plugs, which diesel engines use to produce ignition instead of spark plugs. Lack of electricity in the engine due to faulty wiring or discharged battery may be to blame. A known problem with the Jetta TDI involves improperly assembled drive axles. The problem, which came from Volkswagen's failure to properly place screws on the powertrain cover plate, was the subject of a recall for more than 25,000 vehicles in 2009. In the worst cases, the drive shaft cover may detach and leak oil on the Jetta TDI also suffered from problems with the automatic transmission. That was the cause of another recall in 2009. The recall was adopted to correct faulty wiring in the Jetta direct gearbox, which could cause to switch to neutral without warning, reaching the driver in danger of collision. A common Jetta problem involves smoke coming from the exhaust system, either during the normal break-in period for the diesel engine. However, smoke coming from the older engine may indicate several problems, including improper fuel injectors, clogged air filter or poor quality or contaminated fuel. One set of problems with the Jetta TDI are simply related to its use of diesel fuel and may not indicate faulty components. Burning a small amount of oil is normal for diesel engines, but some drivers are troubled by this or complain about the need to occasionally add motor oil. Car critics from The Truth About Cars website noted that Jetta TDI lacks the responsive performance of its bestseller in the United States, the Jetta sedan, for 2019. We were already driving a pre-production prototype, and now VW has allowed us to crawl on an uncompflaged car at a private event in New York.
