Personal priesthood interview

Ok... This one's for all the dads out there. We have all been instructed that one way we preside in our homes is to conduct personal dignity interviews with our children. This is a very sensitive thing and requires that we live close to the mind. Really, if our kids have problems, they should trust coming to us before they ever go to the bishop. Unfortunately, in most cases this does not happen. Why? Well, these interviews are hard to do and uncomfortable for us. I've found the ultimate solution, and I've shown it to an incredible stake-werking president. So here in a nutshell is how it works. (I can personally attest to the success of this plan... we've been doing it for a few years in our house and it's great!) How to conduct a personal interview: It's called P.I.E. Sunday. This is what you do. The Monday night before Fast Sunday, announce in family night that you're going to set a new procedure in your family routine called P.I.E. Sunday. P.I.E. stands for Personal Interviews for Everyone. Then you explain how the program will work. Pray for guidance as you talk to your family and listen to hunches about what kind of thoughts to share or what questions to ask. Write down these promptings somewhere you won't forget them. I write them down in my planner or in my phone calendar app. On the Saturday night for Fast Sunday, go outside and buy a cake (let your kids choose what kind). Then, on Sunday, take the time to sit down one-on-one with each family member while the cake is baking, and you'll conduct a personal priesthood interview with each of them. I'd like to finish by interviewing my wife. Here's a recommended sketch of how to conduct the interview: Always start with a prayer (you offer it, make sure you mention the child you're also talking to and some of their special talents and

characteristics) Some questions you might ask to start are: How are you doing at school? How are you and your friends? What do you think of things at home? What can I do to be a better father? Then you can jump into some harder topics like: Are you your prayers? How is your relationship with Your Heavenly Father? Do you have any problems I can help you with? Have you come across pornography? What happened? Have you ever heard people cursing around you? How does it make you feel? After your short interview (try to keep it around 15 minutes) you will take some time to achieve some short term goals with that child. Write them down somewhere. I usually write mine in my planner. When your next interview comes, pull these goals out and watch them. Make sure to compliment the child with their efforts. Often I will try to choose a scripture or quote that I can share with them a short principle that they need at that time. Finish with prayer (offered by the child). When you've interviewed everyone, it's time to have cake! I've discovered that's a great way to make what else would be an uncomfortable process something that the family also looks forward to. In our house, my kids even remind me that PIE comes Sunday and they really look forward to the one-on-one time with Dad. It has built great relationships with my kids and it's a great opportunity for me to do some great lessons. Good luck establishing this awesome habit in your homes. You'll never regret it! Eduardo Answer Dear Eduardo, I don't know if you're a quorum president giving these interviews or a quorum member participating, so I'll try to address both sides. Simply put, the personal priesthood interview allows a quorum member to report on his stewardship. It also provides the president with the opportunity to counsel in fulfilling priesthood duties. Both the president and the priesthood holder get to know each other better and increase more love, trust, and trust through this experience. The church handbook of instruction states that quorum leaders visit or interview quorum or group members at least once a year. During these conversations, they encourage quorum and group members to fulfill their priesthood duties, especially their duties as husbands and fathers (2:7.3.2). This gives the president wide latitude in what can be discussed during the interview. He can ask questions about the father's stewardship of his children and the stewardship of the man over his wife. He can ask questions about the principles of foreseeable life (the president's plan[s] ways to meet the welfare needs in the quorum). He may also ask questions about the member's calling and other Church obligations. The president can also take this time to discuss home school stewardship, but that is usually covered by a home-schooling interview (a subset of the personal priesthood interview that focuses on the assigned family). If at any time the interview wanders into dignity issues (such as tithing, the word of wisdom, or the law of chastity), such discussion should be submitted and discussed with the bishop instead. Granted, some of these questions can be uncomfortable. The president should keep that in mind and work on building and keeping the trust needed to interview with confidence and receive some response Given. The president has a spiritual and temporary stewardship of quorum members that is best met if he knows exactly where they are. If a quorum member feels uncomfortable answering some questions (and he should feel free to be more forthcoming (because that's not how priesthood governance works). On the contrary, the president should see a message that the quorum must be strengthened. The specific principle demonstrated through the personal priesthood interview is sometimes referred to as return and report. You see it in the scriptures (especially the parable of the talents), you see it in quorum meetings (when Deacons report on campouts and other activities), you'll even see it when you finally stand on the right bar of God (I've been asked about this before). And yet this report is only part of the principle of stewardship. Elder Russell M. Nelson has given us a map of the stewardship landscape and a key to understanding the reporting in The Five A's of Stewardship (the principles shared are his, the statements are mine). 1. Recognize that God ... is our creator and provider. 2. Recognize the Lord as the author of this principle. If a quorum member is struggling with his duties, these two principles would be a good place to start. The priesthood holder can pray for understanding. The president can testify to the spirit that moves him to make assignments. Assignment can even be included as another 'A' worth discussing and clarifying if necessary. 3. Achieving effective stewardship may be done in the Lord's own way. This is another good place for the priesthood holder to counsel his leader as he struggles with one of his duties. Discuss together what is currently the Lord's own way for that task. 4. Accountability... We read, for it is necessary, on the basis of every steward, to make a record of his stewardship, both in time and in eternity. (D&C 72:3) This is where the personal priesthood conversation and other forms of reporting fit in. Approval or reward for faithful stewardship. I don't think an interview is complete without a sincere assessment of the value the priesthood holder gives to the quorum. Presidents should take the time to express this. Where something is missing, offer the right advice and direction (as stated in the other principles). You can find these principles in the examples I mentioned above (especially the similarity of the talents). Even if your priesthood leader does not call you for an interview, you still experience it in your secret prayers when you provide an accounting of your day and week and feel the approval and counsel of your Father. It may be something they do with everyone, Sam, and not worry you about if they are targeting you specifically for something. For me it's like home schooling ... if they care, they want to meet one on one regularly and provide support and help. If they do it wrong, it's a meeting where they feel they're not doing their job unless they commit you to higher standards of commitment and goals, even if you don't need that right now. So... PPIs usually have to do with accountability and asking how you do it (regarding the TR interview). You'll need to see if they're doing it to assess your commitment, or if they're doing it to be a support and ask if you need anything to help you develop your testimony. But as Roy said... you go with the idea of just seeing what they have in mind... let them have the conversation they feel out for what this is about and why they are doing it. Because it will vary greatly depending on the leader and how they do the PPI. I'd say: Come and go, leaders do them for a while, then not for a while. But... you could prepare for just knowing how you might react if they pressured you to commit to HT more often or do more or prepare to go to the temple and set goals... how would it like to react to that ... prepare your thoughts on giving an accounting of how you do with church service and priesthood duties... And if you let them control the meeting, and you answer as vaguely as you want, and they'll probably just move on to the next member of the quorum and they'll create the box they've met with you.
