First published in 2014 by Fourth Estate, it talks about the definition of feminism for the 21st century. [1] The essay was adapted from Adichie's 2012 TEDx talk of the same name, which was first delivered at TEDx Euston in London,[2] which has been viewed more than six million times. [3] Content that we should all be feminists includes anecdotes and analyses of what it means to be a feminist. She argues that a feminist is not an insult, but rather a label that should be taken by everyone. [quote required] While feminism advocates equality and equality between men and women in all aspects of life, the fiercest opponents of women's liberation believe that feminism is a social movement that focuses on reversing gender roles and inferior to men. Adichie's We Should All Be Feminists, aptly revealing the need to transform social beliefs and gender constructs that promote gender differences. Basically, we should all be feminists not only as a commitment to the liberation of women, but also as a way to encourage men to have conversations with women about sexuality, appearance, roles and success. Being a feminist means promoting women's rights and trying to make the world a better place for women. The book criticises the way masculinity is constructed, suggesting that society as a whole must change if we are to achieve equality. [4] An audio adaptation of Adichie's lecture was included in Beyoncé's 2013 song ***Flawless. Adichie was credited with the stated role on the track. [5] Adichie has she kept quiet about her feelings about Beyoncé's use of her speech, but in an interview with Dutch magazine De Volkskrant in 2016, while acknowledging that with beyoncé's song she reached many people who would otherwise never have heard the word feminism, Adichie said: Yet her type of feminism is not mine, because it's the kind that at the same time gives quite a lot of room for the need for men. I think men are nice, but I don't think women should have a relationship with everything they do with men: hurt me, should I forgive him, put a ring on my finger? We women are so conditioned to connect everything to men. Put together a group of women, and the conversation will eventually be about men. Put together a group of men and they won't talk about women at all, they'll just talk about their own things. We women should spend about 20 percent of our time on men, because it's fun, but otherwise we should be talking about our own things. [6] [7] Reception Book received mostly positive reviews.
