They are always the best resources to use because you can be sure that they accurately reflect the format and content of the actual AP exam. There are three types of official practical resources: The Full Practical Tests College Board has released two full exams, which are combined below. 2012 AP Statistics Released Exam 1997 AP Statistics Released Exam Both links contain full exam, answer key and scoring information. Both of these are very useful test resources, even the 1997 ap stats exam exam hasn't changed much since then. This is the current exam takes three hours with two sections. Students can use the graphical calculator for the entire exam. The content of the exam tests has remained consistent, so despite your age, this test is still a great source to use and gives you a good picture of what your AP exam will look like. The 2012 exam is in the same format as the current exam. Multiple-choice questions the College Board often reuses multiple-choice questions, so there are not many issued official multiple-choice questions available for AP Stats. In addition to multiple choice questions from a published exam, the only official multiple choice questions you can use in your study are a description of the AP statistics course. Starting on page 240, there are 16 multiple questions (as well as 2 free answers), along with an answer key. Questions about free answer compared to multiple choice, choice. There are much more official free-answer questions you can use to learn, and since they are the latest, they will give you a very accurate idea of what to expect in a real exam. The College Board has issued free-answer questions from 1998-2019, meaning that you have dozens of official free answer questions to use for learning. All questions for a free answer include answer keys and sample answers. Unofficial AP Statistics Practice Tests and Quizzes Although they were not created by the College Board, many unofficial AP Statistics practice exams are still of high quality and can be a great source of research. For each resource listed below, I explain what it contains and how to use it. The University of Delaware Faculty of Mathematics at the University of Delaware has created high quality (and free!) AP statistics practice test. It has 40 multiple choice questions and 5 questions for a free answer. The questions are good; however, links to answer keys do not work. If you have multiple selections, click the result summaries to see what the correct answers are. There is no way to see responses to free responses, but you already have a lot of official FRQs to use instead. It is rare for an unofficial source to have a full-size multiple-choice section, so even if you need to bounce back a bit on the site, we think it's worth it. Shmoop Shmoop is the only resource on this list that requires payment to access any of its resources. Paying a monthly fee of about \$25 gives you access to a diagnostic exam, four full practical tests, and additional practical questions. With a paid subscription, you also get access to Shmoop resources for SAT, ACT and other AP exams. Stat Trek is a complete, 40-question, multiple-choice test. You can take the exam at a time or time, and you can choose the answer to each question as soon as you answer it, or wait until the end of the exam to see what the correct answers were. Some of these questions are a bit easier than those found on a real AP exam, but it's still a solid resource. Albert Albert organizes his practical questions into four Great Ideas AP statistics, and Great Ideas are further divided into more detailed topics, each of which has relevant short quizzes that can be useful if you are studying and want to easily find questions on certain topics. Questions are classified as easy, moderate, or difficult, they are not answered, and when you answer each question, you will see the correct answer (plus a detailed explanation). You will need to create a free account that contains a limited number of credits that you can use to answer your questions. If you want to access more questions outside of the initial you must pay a fee of USD 79 for full access. Varsity Tutors Varsity Tutors resources include four diagnostic tests and 139 short practical quizzes organized by topic. Four Four the tests contain 40 multiple-choice questions and, like the Stat Trek test, are similar to, but slightly easier than, a real AP exam. You have time while passing exams and, as a bonus, after completing the exam, the questions are divided into different categories so you can see which categories you did best and which categories should focus on your studies. On this site, I recommend mainly using diagnostic tests because most individual quizzes are so short (only 1-3 questions) that it can be frustrating to constantly start and complete separate quizzes. The free online free online test has a 32-question multiple-choice quiz. This is shorter than the multiple choice section of a real AP exam, but it's a good resource to use if you want a shorter study session. The quiz is not scheduled and is automatically evaluated when the quiz is completed. Kansas State University Quiz and Key Answers this is a 25-question multiple-choice quiz from Kansas State University's Department of Mathematics. The questions are of good quality, although you need to evaluate the quiz yourself (the correct letter is bold in the answer key). This is another good option if you want to answer some practical questions but don't want to pass the full exam. Dan Shuster This site has 24 quizzes (12 multiple choice and 12 free answers). They were created by an AP statistics teacher and according to his teaching schedule. Each multiple choice quiz has 10 questions, and brief explanations of the answers are given at the end of each quiz. Each quiz with a free answer has three questions, as well as explanations of the answers. Questions for a free answer are especially shorter and easier than you'll find on a real AP exam, but you can still use this resource if you want to do a quick, targeted study. How to use these AP practice statistics tests knowing how to use each of these resources will make your studies more effective, as well as prepare for what a real AP statistics exam will be like. Read the guide below to learn how and when to use these hands-on tests and quizzes. First semester At the moment, you're still learning a lot of key information, so during the first semester of AP statistics, you should focus on quizzes and questions about a free answer on topics you've already discussed. Start using these materials around the middle of the semester. Multiple-choice practice For multiple-choice practice, take unofficial quizzes that let you choose the topics you want to be tested on. This allows you to browse content you've already learned and avoid questions about content that has not yet been discussed. The best resources for this are Albert, Varsity Tutors

and Dan Shuster, because their quizzes are organised according to a specific topic. Free-Response Practice For questions about free answers, use the official released questions with a free answer from the Official Hands-on Exams section. Practical. available questions, so review them to find questions you can answer based on what you've already learned. Ideally, you'll answer a group of them (up to six) together at once to get the most realistic preparation for the actual AP exam. It also helps time out when answering these questions, especially since it gets later in the semester. Try spending about 12 minutes on the first five questions and 30 minutes on the investigative task (which will be the last question in the section). The second semester of the second semester is the time when you can start taking full practical exams and continue browsing content you have already learned. Follow these five steps: Step 1: Complete your first complete practice exam for about a month or two this semester, after discussing most of the content you need to know during the AP exam, pass your first full practice exam. In this first practical test, I recommend taking the official practical exam from 1997. You should take this time test and in one sitting and then correct it when finished. If you haven't already, it's a good time to set a goal for yourself. Aim for at least 3, as this is the lowest exam score. However, if you have scored 3 or more points in this first training test, it is worth setting the goal score even higher, to 4 or 5. Getting a higher score on the AP Stats exam looks more impressive on college campuses, and sometimes it can get you more college loans. Step 2: Analyze the results of the results after you figure out the result, look at each problem you answered incorrectly and try to figure out why you have the wrong question. As you do, look for patterns in the results. Do you discover that you have a lot of questions about the experimental project wrong? Have you done well on multiple selections, but struggled with a free response? Figuring out which problems you have wrong and why is the best way to stop repeating your mistakes and make improvements for future exams. Even if it seems tedious, don't be tempted to skip this step! Step 3: Focus on weak areas Now you should have a good idea of the areas or techniques you need to work on to raise your score. If there are specific areas of content you need to work on, review them by going over your notes, reading a review book, and answering multiple choice questions and free answers that focus specifically on those topics. If you are struggling with test techniques, for example, run out of time for an exam or misread questions, the best way to combat these problems is to answer many practical questions under realistic test conditions. Step 4: Pass the skill test After time to improve the weak areas, it's time to see the results of your hard work. Take and get another full practical exam, with the right date and completed at one meeting. This is a good time to use 2012 official released exam or multiple choice section from the University of Delaware + a set of official free-answer questions. Step 5: Review the results to determine your future study plan Now you can see how much you have improved and in what areas, from the first full skill test. If you've made improvements and achieved or are close to your target score, you may only need to study lightly from now on for the AP exam. However, if you haven't improved too much or are still far from your goal, you need to analyze the way you browse and think about ways to improve. The most common reason for not improving is not actively studying, but only passively viewing notes or viewing missed questions. Active study takes longer and requires more effort, but this is the best way to see a significant improvement. As you study, make sure you really understand exactly where you made the mistake with each practical question you answer incorrectly. Also, when you review your notes, pause every few minutes and mentally go through what you've just learned to make sure you're storing information. You can repeat these steps as many times as you need to make improvements and achieve your target score. If you need more complete practical tests, you can create your own by combining a set of official questions for a free answer with 40 unofficial multiple-choice questions. Stat Trek and Varsity Tutors are probably the best resources to use for multiple choice questions because each of their exams already has 40 questions combined for you. Conclusion: Where to find AP Statistics Practice Exams If you want to get well on the AP Statistics exam, you almost certainly need to take the practical tests. Official resources are the best to use, but there are also many high quality unofficial quizzes and tests that should be used.
