A man and a woman have been arrested and face child neglect charges after allegedly leaving the 3-year-old at an LA Fitness children's club in Florida so they could go drinking. Thomas Kern, 57, and Rossana Alvarez, 40, were held last week at Palm Beach County Jail (FL) in place of \$3000 bail, the Fort Lauderdale Sun-Sentinal reported. Kern or Alvarez's relationship with a 3-year-old girl is unclear. Kern dropped the girl off at LA Fitness in Palm Beach Gardens with the intention of drinking, according to a police report. From Sun-Sentinal: The girl said she hasn't ate all day and despite the gym's policy that children can't be left at the Club for more than 2 hours, or [parents can't] leave the gym without a child, the girl's parents weren't around, according to the report. The employee told police that the girl had been there for four hours and after trying numerous times to call the person who left the girl, later identified as Kern, no one answered. The girl was eventually picked up and stayed with relatives. A spokesman for LA Fitness, Irvine, CA, declined to comment on the incident for Club Industry. Open a gym when we're not in class. Is it really your favorite place to learn about businesses? INDIANAPOLIS — An Indianapolis mom talks about what she says are dangerous conditions at the gym daycare where she recently worked. Katie Lyman, a mother of two, told Call 6 she was investigating a loophole in the state of Indiana that could be to blame. Lyman said she worked at the LA Fitness Kids Club on Southport Road, which is where parents can leave their children for an hour or two while they work. I knew right away, something was a little bad, Lyman said. For the first few days, the kids were just running around crazy, violent, and there were no special rules. We had food and drink mix-ups with cups and binkies. Lyman said at one point that she watched 17 children alone. All were under the age of six, Lyman said. It was chaos. Lyman painted broken toys, hair, spraying on walls, and what she called dirty conditions throughout the Children's Club. She said she repeatedly brought her concerns to gym management. I was just worried about all the safety of the kids, Lyman said. I didn't want to be the one to go wrong in my watch. Somebody's going to get hurt or get sick. Lyman said she brought her own baby door to separate young children from older children. I brought my own Lysol wipes and sprays, Lyman said. I tried to do as much as I could, Lyman contacted Call 6 Investigates, and we contacted the Indiana Family and Social Services Administration (FSSA), the state agency that licenses and regulates childcare. An FSSA spokeswoman said the general rule is that childcare is exempt if they care for children for less than four hours a day rather than consecutive days. So this means that gym child care facilities and many after-school programs are exempt - the state does not review them or have to follow health and safety regulations such as ratios between child and staff and CPR and safe sleep training. RELATED | The mother warns about broken equipment in daycare centers after the death of her daughter I don't think parents know that there are no codes to follow, and no one monitors cleanliness, Lyman said. They are not regulated in any way. Call 6 Investigations Left from the front at LA Fitness on Southport Road.RTV6 also called and emailed the corporate media relations office at LA Fitness and sent a tweet to the company, but we have not yet received a response. Katie Lyman said she was fired after 2.5 weeks on the job. She posted her concerns about the kids club's terms on Facebook, and her post has now been shared more than 300 times. She hopes to inspire changes to the facility and educate parents who drop off their children at any childcare gym. Lyman often said she couldn't reach her parents when there was a problem. At the very least, check the file for a phone number, Lyman said. If nothing else, you can at least contact each other if something happens. Sometimes I'd call these phones, and no one answered. Lyman said she reported the conditions to the Marion County Department of Public Health.RTV6 has reached out to the health department, and we're still waiting to have them get back to us. Kirsten Eamon-Shine, director of Statewide Communications & Engagement for Early Learning Indiana, said parents should understand how different types of childcare are regulated. Parents should inquire about staff training, certification of safe sleep, constant training on behavioral management, Eamon-Shine said. We also recommend families visit programs regularly - beyond drop-off times and pick up, Eamon-Shine said.The chart on this page allows families to know what each type of care is, as well as health and safety standards. If there is a question mark on any of the items, it is important for families to ask the provider what they are doing to ensure the safety of children, Eamon-Shine said. Regardless of the level of regulation, parents can inquire about carers' background checks, group sizes and ratios, caregiver education, and health and safety. HOW TO CHECK YOUR CHILDCARE FACILITY• Attach your service provider's name to ChildCareFinder.IN.gov and look for complaints, review reports and any pending implementations• Use your eyes and ears when visiting. Are they following a safe dream? Does the equipment work? Are children strapped to their high chairs?• Remember unexpectedly until your child's day during the day. What is seen when picking up and disembarking can be very different from what happens in the middle of the day• Ask to see the license or provider registration, which should be published on public land. If the provider is on probation, they will say so on licence, along with the reasons why.• Ask to see a copy of the day care disciplinary policy.
