The naval officer has arrived at the beach just as Ralph is trying to escape from Jack and his tribe, who are trying to escape from Jack and life with laws and consequences. The officer asks Ralph if there are any dead, and Ralph tells him that two children were killed. The officer is shocked to learn that two children were killed. Ralph starts crying and the other kids started crying too. The naval officer represents civilization and civility that the children have almost forgotten. Ralph cries because they realize that they have become savages and that they have murdered their friends. The officer represents civilization, but he also represents the horror of civilization: war. It may be cleaner - and the officer may not need his nose dried - but it's no less wild. He stumbles upon the head of the sole, Lord of the Flies, now just a shiny white skull — as white as the conklight shell, he notes. Angry and nauseous, Ralph knocks his skull to the ground and takes the effort it was impaled to use as a weapon against Jack. That night, Ralph sneaks down to the camp at Castle Rock and finds Sam and Eric quarding the entrance. The twins feed him, but refuse to go with him. They tell him that Jack plans to send the whole tribe after him the next day, Ralph hides in a thicket and falls asleep. In the morning, he hears Jack talking and torturing one of the twins to find out where Ralph is hiding. Several boys try to fight their way into thickets, but Ralph fends them off. Then Ralph smells smoke and realizes jack's set fire to the jungle to smoke him out. Ralph leaves his hiding place and fights his way past Jack and a group of hunters. Chased by a group of hunters through the underwood, looking for a place to hide. Finally, he ends up on the beach, where he collapses in exhaustion, the stalkers close behind. All of a sudden Ralph looks up to see a naval officer standing over him. The officer tells the boy that his ship has arrived on the island after seeing the burning fire in the jungle. Jack's hunters come to the beach and stop in their tracks when they see the officer. The officer actually assumes that the boys are up to, as he puts it, fun and games. When he learns what has happened on the island, the officer is reproached: How could this group of boys, he and English boys, have lost all reverence for the rules of civilization in such a short time? For his part, Ralph is overwhelmed by the knowledge that he has been rescued, that he will escape the island after coming so close to a violent death. He starts crying, so do the other boys. Moved and embarrassed, the naval officer turns his back so the boys can regain their composure. Analysis After Ralph's Tense, Exciting Stand hunters, the end of the Lord of the Flies abounds with irony. Ralph had thought that the signal fire — a symbol of civilization — was the only way to lure rescuers to the island. Ironically, although it is actually a fire that lures a ship to the island, it is not an ordered, controlled signal fire, but rather the random wildfire Jack's hunters set solely to kill Ralph. As we have seen, Ralph has worked tirelessly to retain the structure of civilization and maximize the boys' chances of being rescued. Now, when all he can do is struggle to stay alive for as long as possible, a deus ex machina (an unlikely or unexpected device or character who suddenly seems to solve a situation) appears at the last possible moment, in the form of the naval officer who brings the boys back to a world of law, order and society. Golding's use of irony in the last chapter blurs the boundary between civilization and savagery and implies that the two are more closely connected than history has illustrated. Ultimately, the terrible ferocity of the boys leads to the rescue that their coordinated and measured efforts were unable to achieve. Much of the irony at the end of the Lord of flies is still not particularly happy, and the moment when the officer meets the boys is not one of untouched joy. The officer says he is unable to understand how upstanding British boys could have acted in such bad shape. Ironically, this civilized officer himself is part of an adult world where violence and war go hand in hand with civilization and social order. He reacts to the wild children with disgust, but this disgust is characterized by hypocrisy. Similarly, the children are so shocked by the officer's presence, and are now psychologically so far removed from his world, that they do not immediately celebrate his arrival. Rather, they stand in front of him confused and confused. Even Ralph, whose life has literally been saved by the ship's presence, cries the tears of grief instead of joy. For Ralph, as for the other boys, nothing can ever be as it was until he came to the island of The Lord of flies. Flies.
