On the shortcomings, because it is worth considering:—Once you leave the mushroom kingdom with stipes and caps, the organizational scheme of the dishes can be confused and it can be difficult to find something similar to the fungus you found if you are not looking for every page of the dishes. Womp womp. -The boards no longer depict stages of development, so immature specimens or specimens with unusual reproductive stages will be very difficult to identify. -The plates only give the common name of the fungus, so you have to go to the corresponding page in the text section to find the genus and species if you want to look for it immediately. -The photos do not always come with the best lighting, which can be quite infuriating if you're out figuring out which exact species of Russula you collected in the wild. -Descriptions of the species are excellent, but when a commonly mistaken species is listed, that doesn't mean the species is present in the book. -I Winter mycophiles may be disappointed by the relative scarcity of crusts, myxomycetes and polypores discussed in this book. That said, I can't help but give this guide five stars. It made me move forward and keep me going, especially when I couldn't be picky about taking photos from all the right angles and collecting samples for closer inspection at home. In addition, grouping similar-looking species in tables and text facilitates identification by elimination process for who (like me) just want to know what the damn thing is probably called. PLEASE NOTE: THIS THIS IT IS NOT ENOUGH FOR THOSE WHO WANT TO EAT WILD MUSHROOMS AND SURVIVE. Edibility is mentioned, but since the assembly of species in this guide is not exhaustive, it is absolutely essential to avoid eating everything you think you have identified until you have consulted other books aimed specifically at myophages, of which there are several. more This is a huge guide full of color plates and an excellent key system. It contains enough information to satisfy someone who has been identifying fungi for several years, and many dishes show phenotypic differences among the most popular species. I wouldn't recommend this book to someone who wants to learn mushroom hunting unless they have previous experience with Audubon guides. I just think this book is a little too dense for a beginner -- the pages and pages of MSLs are a little too intense for someone who might be interested in identifying the most distinctive edibles like morels and oysters.
