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1 Mark the place on the wall where you want the mirror to hang. Place the mirror against the wall in the desired position. Use a pencil to mark around the top and bottom corners. Take the mirror off the wall and save it from the path. This step will be easier with the help of another person who can hold the mirror in place while you mark. [1] Clips are best for small frameless mirrors. If you hang a large mirror, use J-channels or Z-clips that can support more weight. Usually it is advisable to put a little mirror putty on the back of something like this for greater safety. You can also buy hardware that will make the mirror look like it's floating off the wall, which looks really great. 2 Use the level to make sure the mirror hangs straight. Based on the corner markers you've created, use a water level to draw straight lines across the wall, where the top and bottom edges of the mirror will go. To use a watermark, look for a bubble in the tube. If it is evenly spaced between two black center lines, then the edge is straight. If it slips to one side, adjust the angle of the level until the bubble sits in the middle. [2] 3 Make sure the wall is flat. Trimming the mirror too tightly against a bumpy wall can cause it to break. To locate bumps, slide a board with straight edges that is longer than the mirror itself over the wall. Scale is a good choice, but if it's too short, try a straight piece of 1 inch (2.5 cm) x 3 inches (7.6 cm) lumber. He's going to swing back and forth over a bump. Mark these spots with a pencil and sharpen them. [3] Power sanders are the simplest and fastest method. You can also use sandpaper wrapped around a wooden block. 4 Locate and mark the pins in the wall. The studs are evenly spaced wooden support beams, which can be found behind most of the inner walls in the area where you plan to hang the mirror. If you don't have a stud finder, can approximate the location of the pins by tapping the wall. The taps between the pins will sound hollower, while the taps on the pins will sound firmer. [4] If the mirror is positioned to fall directly between the pins, consider shifting its position so that at least one clamp can be screwed into the pin. 5 Indicate where you want to install the bottom mirror terminals. Distribute them evenly, depending on the width of the mirror and the number of clips you have. The mirror manufacturer may have recommendations on how to place clips as efficiently as possible. Using a pencil, make a dot where the screw will go for each clip. Make sure that you align the bottom edge of the clip with the line you drew that marks the bottom edge of the mirror. The marking for pilot holes drops 1.2 inches (1.3 cm) to 1 inch (2.5 cm) above the line, depending on the size of the clips. 6 Drill the pilot holes and install the bottom clamps on the wall. Use the drill to drill holes in the places you have marked. If one of the pilot holes does not fall on the pin, tap the plastic anchor with the hammer until it is in one plane with the wall. Place the clamp over each hole of the pile and screw it into the wall with a screwdriver or drill. Make sure you're using the correct clips. The bottom clamps usually consist of two L-shaped pieces. 7 Mark where you plan to screw the top clips. Using a watermark, draw the line vertically up from each bottom clip until it interseques with the line for the top edge of the mirror. Drop the top edge of the top clip with this point. Indicate where the pilot hole should be drilled. As with the lower terminals, pilot holes should fall 1.2 inches (1.3 cm) to 1 inch (2.5 cm) below the top line. 8 Drill the pilot holes and screw the top clip holders into place. If any of the holes are not located above the pin, insert the wall anchors into the drywall until their lips are in one plane with the drywall. Unscrew both parts of the top clip. The larger piece is the holder - screw each one into place on the wall. 9 Screw the remaining upper clamps to attach the mirror to the wall. Slide the mirror into the lower terminals. Carefully tilt the mirror backwards so that it rests in one plane against the wall. Mount the other pieces of the upper clamps in the upper brackets and screw them together just so that they hold the mirror firmly in place. 1 Mark the place where the mirror should hang with a pencil. Hold the mirror against the wall in the desired position and mark the top and bottom corners with a pencil. Use the level to ensure that the mirror does not hang crooked. Parallel to the lines you drew, but about 1 inch (2.5 cm) inside, glue 4 pieces of paint tape to the wall. [5] The painter's tape indicates the area where the mirror will be glued to the wall. Then coat the sandblasted area with primer and leave to dry. [6] 4 Install a temporary wooden brace that supports the bottom edge of the mirror. Remove the painter's tape from the wall. Drill a piece of plywood into the wall so that its upper part is in one plane with the marked bottom edge of the mirror. [7] If you are installing a mirror in the bathroom, you can often use backsplash boards as lower support, rather than installing a temporary brace. [8] Apply the adhesive to the rear of the mirror. You will need a high-quality adhesive known as putty, which is often used in the construction industry. The manufacturer recommends the ideal pattern for the application. Make sure that the sealant keeps at least 2 inches (5.1 cm) from the edge to avoid squirting when pressed against the wall. [9] Make sure you are using a type of sealant that is specifically designed for mounting mirrors. Use of a different kind could damage the silver coating on the back of the mirror. [10] 6 Glue the mirror firmly to the wall. Rest one corner of the mirror to support and keep the other slightly raised. Push him against the wall to lift the corner to slide back down and the rest against the support, spreading glue over the surface of the wall. Using a clean painter roller, firmly push the mirror into the wall. [11] For added safety, glue pieces of paint tape to the upper corners of the mirror until the glue dries completely. Allow the putty to dry for about 24 hours. [12] 7 Remove the wooden brace and fix all the holes. Once the putty has completely edging out, use the drill to unscrew the wooden orthosis from the wall. Use a silent knife to spread the wrapping through all the holes left over from drilling the brace into the wall. Dissimit spackling smooth and paint through it with a color that matches the wall of the existing color. Peel off all the remaining painting tapes. Be sure to check local building regulations. Some areas may require in addition to glue in addition to glue when mounting mirrors.
