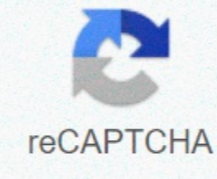

Some of you may be deterred by the religious undertone of the title. Stay with me. This is a book about empowerment, which Fox identifies as the true teachings of Jesus, not the misinterpretation of most organized religion. Probably a good time to say that I am not reprehensible about the impact of her church or her place in the life of anyone. Stay with what works for you. Stay true to all or any part of the doctrine you have dedicated yourself to. But, do yourself a favor and take a look at this philosophy and the tools that are offered here. They changed life for me. One or two words about the author. Emmet Fox was an early leader in New Thought. His lectures during the Depression in New York City attracted more than 5,000 a week. His conclusions made great sense to me. For years, Fox says, biblical scholars have misinterpreted the teachings of Jesus. The power of which he spoke and which he indicated is at our disposal to all of us. There is no vengeful God, no human-like creature or dad in the clouds who watch over us and punish our evils. Instead, there is a scientific principle based on the concept that we are all powerful, with equal access to the same source of power, and that we are born with all the tools we need to create a life that is joyful, productive, and loving. Blessed are the meek; for they will inherit the earth. On the surface, this Beatitude seems to have very little meaning, and what exists seems to be refuted by the simple facts of daily life. No reasonable person who looks around the world or studies history could sincerely accept this proverb, and most honest Christians have, in practice, had the unfortunate feeling that things should undoubtedly be so, but that they certainly are not. But that attitude will not. Sooner or later the soul reaches a point where excuses and sophistries must be discarded once and for all and the fact of life is confronted at all costs. Now Jesus meant what he said, or he did not; and either he knew what he was talking about, or he didn't. And if this proverb is not to be taken seriously, we are driven to the position that Jesus said what he did not really believe, how unscrupulous people do it, or that he spoke nonsense. We must face up to this situation at the very beginning of our study of this Sermon on the Mount. Either Jesus is to be taken seriously, or he is not to be taken seriously, in this case his teaching should be dropped completely and people should stop calling themselves Christians. To pay lip service to his name, to say that Christianity is the God-inspired truth of boasting about being A Christian, and then quietly bypassing all the definitive implications of his teaching, is hypocrisy and weakness of the absolutely deadliest kind. Either Jesus is a reliable leader, or he is not. If you want to rely on him, I pay tribute to him for assuming that he meant what he said, and that he was best aware of the art of life.
