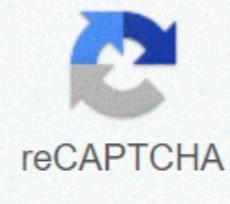

Donna Marsh's phone number portability allows consumers to transfer the service from one communications company to another without changing their phone numbers. Mobile phone users have been doing this for years when they change hands. Home phone users switching to a competing landline operator use the same technology. Whether you've decided to switch your landline or go completely wireless, here's how to make a smooth and successful switch and keep your phone number at home. Buy a new carrier - either wirelessly or on a landline - and make your decision based on plan options and service coverage. I know to use \*67 at home if I want to do this, but the cell selection is different - you don't get this double dial tone to let you know that you're now limiting your number. Simply start the number you call with your cell with the \*67, as if the phone number starts with these three digits. It is important that you must enter the 1 before the area code, as cells do not normally need the 1. On my phone, the caller ID uses this method to call a private call. Seems like an intelligent way to keep your number to yourself if you want to avoid making it known to the world. Of course, this is probably the pervy stalker's only biggest weapon. Please use only forever. Free Internet phone numbers are available from Google Voice, and apps like FreedomPop, TextNow and TextFree. Readers request the phone directory by filling out a call in the local history and genealogy reading room. Write phone directory as phone number, city and state as title and year as volume number. View phone directories in microfilm by going into the LJ 139B reading room and accessing the self-service microfilm collection, which also includes microfilmed phone books from 1976 to 1995. Current telephone directories cover the years from 1996 to the present day, and readers can find them on deck 46 of the main reading room, where they are stored alphabetically by state. This place also houses many current foreign telephone directories, which are arranged alphabetically by country. The reading rooms for territorial studies also contain some current foreign directories.
