Malcolm X goes behind bars at least in part because of negative educational opportunities. But ironically, he finds freedom because he gives himself the bonds between culture and learning that society has deprived him of it. Malcolm X's self-transformation novel also resembles ideas about thinking and self-empowerment, to self-creativity and self-invention within the dynamic personal space of intelligence, activity, culture and language used by Benjamin Franklin. Malcolm X and Franklin have created learning areas. This choice is about how a man in prison was able to teach himself to become more knowledgeable than ever. When Malcolm X was in prison, he chose to read constantly and copy the dictionary to gain knowledge. It's as simple as it started copying dictionary pages at a time. Malcolm's going to stay all night reading, but making sure the guards are in jail. I see him as they pass through his locker every hour. He refers to his education as homemade. Born in Omaha, Nebraska, on May 19, 1925, to The Reverend Earl and Louise Little, Malcolm, one of eight children , became (partly because of his light skin) the preciously beloved child of his father, a roving minister and organized leader of the Marcus Garvey Movement to Return to Africa the World Negro Improvement Society (UNIA) in Lansing, Michigan. Pastor Little was involved with what many good white Christian people (Smith, p. 55) including members of the Black Legion and the Ku Klux Klan - considered troublesome, an extreme black movement that led to his violent murder in which his body was severely beaten, run over by a street car, almost cut into two. Although Malcolm was six years old, he remembers the nightmare of everything. Malcolm records the tragic consequences of the family's decline and eventual separation, including the mental breakdown of his mother and the inevitable separation of his family, when he and his brothers were placed in a nursing home. Despite the instability that followed in his young life, Malcolm excelled in education, and even became president and superior in his eight-grade class. However, Malcolm's ambition to become a lawyer by profession was frustrated by his English teacher, who told him: You have to be realistic about being a negro. Describes events taking place at different locations throughout the United States of America, in Harlem, New York, Detroit and other important cities. The biography was a collective result of the efforts of Alex Haley and Malcolm and while the autobiography was written and edited by Alex Haley, it was based on numerous interviews with Malcolm X, and therefore the biography is told from Malcolm's point of view and offers a self-perspective. Tragic, displeased, repugnant the protagonist is Malcolm X and the antagonist is Elijah Muhammad. The main conflict is between Malcolm and Elijah, and is presented as the result of Elijah's jealousy. The story reaches its climax when Malcolm decides to leave the Nation of Islam. The fire in chapter two heralds the death of Malcolm's father long after the fire. He also spoke with different people who would be willing to do so. The biography also makes hints about the different types of racism that existed in America during those times. Because of the social and political context, many were afraid of foreigners and those who were different from them. The Japanese people and those believed to be communists were also discriminated against and forced to suffer because they lived in a paranoid society. Malcolm's picture of Harlem is very important because Harlem is seen as a place where racism is perpetuated year after year and group after group. What Malcolm notes is that Harlem was used as home by other persecuted groups as well as Italians and Jews, for example. Harlem therefore becomes synonymous with racism and becomes a visual representation of racism. In his autobiography, Malcolm is regarded as a paradox because of the mixed messages he received as a child. While he encourages study, he also states that he will never be allowed to retain a position above whites and that he should choose a suitable position and become a carpenter. This happens again when Malcolm thinks about interracial relations. While those around him encourage him to talk to white girls, Malcolm realizes the fact that if he were to start a relationship with a white girl, his life could be in danger. A parallel between Malcolm and his father can be drawn in the sense that their lives are very similar. Both suffer from violent death caused by people who oppose them because of their ideas and both have become notorious for their ideas and beliefs. When Malcolm chose the name X, he wanted to have a l'toonical sense. The reason he chose this particular name was to represent the black names lost through slavery as well as to try to return them and restore their individuality.
