How to cite a handbook with no author in apa

Basic book quotesIn the APA style, a reference list cited for a book gives the author of the work, the published year, the italyed title and the publisher's information. This is no different when you are quoting a manual. Set this information as follows: Author's last name, Initial First(s). (Year of publication). Book title: Include subtitle as well. Editor Location: Editor Name. Use this citation style for a manual, unless it is created by a company or packaged with a product. For example: Spellenberg, R. (1998). National Audubon Society Field Guide to North American Wildflowers: Western Region. New York, NY: Alfred A. Knopf. Manuals issued by employers are cited instead with the name of the organization that employs as a book author. Unless the manual is published externally, the publisher's information for the manual should be the company's location. Substitute Author for the publisher name because the company is already listed as the author: First National Bank. (1992). Employee practices and standards. Omaha, NE: Author. APA quotes use a different format if you have retrieved the manual from a Web source. Whenever you include a Web source in the APA reference list, the URL is included instead of the publisher's information: the New York State Executive Department. (2011). Equal employment opportunities in the state of New York. Taken from . Citing a product manual or ManualSoftware, cars and complex cars can also come bundled with a manual. Citing these manuals requires information about the company and the name of the product with which the manual was included: the name of the company. (Year). Product title: Manual title. Editor Location: Editor. Product manuals also replace the Author for the publisher if the publishing company is listed as the author of the source: Nissan. (2004). Altima: Owner's Guide. Not all APA APA are on a reference list. While the reference list includes all sources, you will also need to quote the sources in the text of the paper when you quote or paraphrase them. To do this, insert a set of parentheses after the source reference. Place the source author, year of publication, and page number of the quoted information in parentheses -- if the source has page numbers. Use the company name if the author is a company. For example: (Spellenberg, 1998, p. 427) (First National Bank, 1992) (Nissan, 2004, pp. 81-83) 81-83)
