There is also an option for a character workbook and an accompanying reader to practice reading, but these are definitely harder to locate. Volumes 5 and 6 come with only one book. There is also a test brochure and quiz that you can buy for Volume 1 to use as a self-test to verify your knowledge. You can continue with this both series until you complete them, but in general, they are ideal for the it's just getting started. The beginning levels, Volumes 1-2, are what I recommend. Personally, I believe that there are better options for intermediate and advanced stages. Intermediate to High-Intermediate Stage At this stage, you should know an acceptable level of vocabulary and the majority of the main grammar. Here, you want to focus mainly on: Idioms Idioms Suggestion Structures Vocabulary More complex dialogues /larger text This is the clumsy middle stage of language learning where manuals are a little harder to find and quality is extremely difficult to identify. Below is the cream of the crop, as they say. 1. Beyond the basics This is by far, one of my favorite Chinese books, along with the next recommendation. After completing level 2, Part 2 of the 3rd edition Integrated Chinese series, will be transferred over it beyond the basics. It was a big leap in the level, but a challenge I loved. I found the completed Chinese books to be quite repetitive and predictable, so beyond the basics it was the perfect next manual. It has nice, long passages, a huge variety of words, including useful complementary vocabulary. A balanced range of idioms and useful exercises incorporated at the end of each chapter are also extremely useful for increasing your vocabulary range. Each chapter has a different theme, unlike the integrated Chinese series based on a set of characters and their lives at school. In between, it's definitely more interesting to talk about social issues and more practical conversations that you may actually have in Chinese, if you know what I mean. Another option you could go for is the book of a new China, which is the manual that comes before this next book recommendation. While I've used the next book, I've never used a new China, so I can't vouch for its quality. Nevertheless, briefly looking at the content, it seems to be a slightly easier manual compared to beyond the basics. 2. All things considered This is my other love book, except the basics. This is called Advanced Reader, but I would really like to sort it in the high-intermediate stage. Introduces the student perfectly to the advanced stage. This is like the advanced sequel to Beyond the Basics. The transition from one to the other is so smooth and the vocabulary is extremely useful and practical. There are so many useful sentence structures and grammar examples. There are also many exercises at the end of each chapter that emphasize synonyms and grammar points. This manual is divided into two parts. The first 12 chapters take the form of dialogues. Chapters 13 to 32 are actual newspaper articles published in the past. This is a great way to go smoothly to the advanced stage of Chinese. Advanced stage In fact, at this stage you can experiment with simpler novels or reading newspapers. We don't have to stick to the traditional approach However, I am fully aware that having the structure of a book is something that many people like, so I have included some of my favorites below. Discussing everything This is a set of 2 volumes, the first advertised at the upper intermediate level and the second at the advanced level. To be perfectly honest, both should be classified as advanced. I remember taking this book around the time of Beyond the Basics and it was very difficult and overwhelming. A challenge is nice, but it has to be appropriate when it comes to languages like Mandarin. In any case, this series is structured with main chapters with a total, looser theme, and then sub-sections with more specific dialogs and paragraph text. Many colloquial and informal Chinese words are introduced, which is super useful. A wide range of advanced vocabulary is also listed, as well as a huge range of example sentences. 2. Advanced spoken Chinese If you want to improve your colloquial Chinese and, at the same time, learn more about Chinese culture, then look no further. This book is a set of 2 and provides dialogues according to common daily life scenarios. There is almost no English in these books, which is something to note, compared to the others mentioned. There are also additional texts provided that are useful, as well as a comprehensive list of idioms and commonly used advanced phrases. From this point on, read novels, articles, and newspapers. Immerse yourself in different media formats. Listen to Chinese podcasts and music, watch Chinese TV shows and TV programs. The more you sink, the sooner and better you'll learn. It's that simple.
