Much of the humour is verbal as characters take a literal interpretation of what others say, use redundant expressions and non-sequiturs. Alongside this verbal aspect there was more conventional humour. Mallard encountered bizarre behaviour from his featured characters and their counterparts. For all his own mediocrity and haplessness he could appear sane and competent compared to those alongside him.

In his essay People Like Usjournalist David Brooks People Like Us the ironic tendency of human communities to endorse principles of diversity without really attempting to put them into practice.

Brooks critiques contemporary conceptions of diversity in America, arguing that they generally serve to make the country more homogenous as people with similar views geographically and digitally consolidate. Brooks exhorts his audience to People Like Us of new ways to implement diversity measures, from serving the country to moving out of the country and into more diverse cosmopolitan environments.

The essay received positive criticism for helping to spark a timely, if contentious, debate on the true state of ideological diversity in America. In his own life, he People Like Us, he has mostly observed people going to extreme lengths to find their in-group and remain there. Brooks turns to social science, noting that humans constantly form and adhere People Like Us social categories, often without conscious choice.

He takes an example from Washington D. He extrapolates this phenomenon to geography as a whole, explaining that most people, if asked to swap their home for one of equivalent value in a nearby area that was qualitatively different, would instantly decline. Brooks explains that America People Like Us not People Like Us towards total sameness. This leads to the establishment of numerous self-selecting ideological enclaves. He uses the example of Boulder, Colorado, whose reputation as a haven for liberal, free-spirited mountain biker types has led to a parodic proliferation of that identity in the city.

Ironically, the properties that make places distinct are the very things that cause them to become homogenous and over-colonized. One such definition is strictly confined to matters of race. Though that is a particularly necessary kind of diversity in a People Like Us that rampantly discriminates, Brooks believes that it is also reductive, failing to capture, and even deliberately excluding, the other valuable forms of diversity.

He argues that reduced definitions of diversity do not hold the same power and cannot exert their influence for long. In these suburbs, the rich and the poor gradually move apart into their own areas, only reinforcing racial economic disparity. He People Like Us that as we celebrate ideals of diversity daily, we consciously and unconsciously work to squelch them. For example, most privileged people would consider it a laughable notion to decline an opportunity for a good job or elite education out of People Like Us abstract notion of equality or to reopen the opportunity for a less privileged person they have never met.

Further, Brooks excoriates the average American for being aggressively ignorant and intolerant of other people. In his view, the absence of certain ideological groups, such as Evangelical Christians, from social roles, such as academia, is a symptom of this ideological isolation and self-selection.

At the end of the essay, Brooks qualifies his thesis by acknowledging that any context has a limit where the benefits of increasing diversification begin to diminish.
