Every good story is about change. Change is an essential part of Positive Education. Like the characters from our favourite books and movies, changing the landscape of a school does not imply there is something wrong with your school to start with, that your school is currently somehow doing Negative Education; rather Positive Education is about celebrating, shifting and broadening the scope of what a school already does.

Renowned storyteller, George Lucas is known to have used this template in constructing his epic Stars Wars. The narrative involves a series of stages whereby the hero moves from their ordinary world to confront a major challenge and returns to their home transformed. Many schools are called to the Positive Education: The Geelong Grammar School Journey of Positive Education due to their increasing awareness about the wellbeing of young people both in school and beyond the school gates.

Statistics in this area have been very useful in helping us understand the magnitude of the problem. Statistics can be overwhelming because of their magnitude, leaving people with the feeling that they cannot make a difference. In describing the kind of problems we face in relation to mental health, we need to make such statistics meaningful and personal so that they appeal to the head and heart.

Even our most courageous heroes like Harry Potter and Dorothy from Wizard of Oz will resist the change being put to them. Similarly, educators confronting these statistics may not see the need for change and instead opt for no change. Like our favourite heroes, change-makers and school leaders need to make a stronger case for Positive Education by appealing to how the external problem impacts educators, how each member of the school community are a significant part of the solution and how exciting and worthwhile the journey will be.

Below, we address questions that may arise: Mental health problems can be largely invisible to the untrained eye. Change-makers need to find a way of connecting mental Positive Education: The Geelong Grammar School Journey statistics to the everyday reality of school life. A teacher is much more likely to be on board when mental health problems are humanized, for example, when they have worked and struggled alongside children and families suffering mental illness.

Making a stronger case might involve the sensitive sharing of stories about people who have been affected by mental illness. Helping school staff to empathise with one person through a story can be much more effective than discussing the general problems of many.

Another angle is to tie Positive Education to something teachers already care about — learning. There is a significant amount of research supporting the reciprocal relationship between mental health problems and learning. A comprehensive review of mental health and learning by The Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences in found that experiences of early school failure predicted the onset of mental health problems, and conversely mental health problems negatively impacted academic achievement.

It is important to connect this research finding with activities teachers already do. In the famous novel Lord of the Rings, Frodo, the hobbit, is approached by Galdof, the great wizard, and asked to go on a dangerous quest safe-guarding a ring.

Understanding that everyone has a role to play in the wellbeing of the school community is at the heart of GGS's applied Positive Education: The Geelong Grammar School Journey of Learn it, Live it, Teach it, Embed it. When teaching mathematics we would demonstrate how we want students to set out their sums by modelling it on the board.

If a teacher had the habit of doing sums in their head, then it is unlikely students would develop habits of setting out sums correctly. Positive Education: The Geelong Grammar School Journey a similar way, if a teacher loses their temper easily and cannot find any time within the day, it would be hard for students to learn how to effectively balance the demands of school life from that teacher.

Setting and creating the vision is an essential part of the Call to Adventure for all members of the school community. Dorothy did not follow the yellow brick road just for fun, she followed the road to get home. Having a clear vision of where the school wants to go with Positive Education inspires others to go on the journey and protects against the inevitable moments of confusion and disillusionment.

The way in which change-makers and school leaders set-up the vision is important. Many schools have successfully used backward design thinkingbeginning with a discussion of the purpose of education, and the skills Positive Education: The Geelong Grammar School Journey attributes they want their students to leave their school with.

Visions tend to run into problems when they are too abstract, not really lived or shared by all. It is best to construct visions in such a way that each person in the community understands how they can work towards it. It is at these stages that schools must make important decisions about who they will consult with, who will be trained and how they will proceed.
