It is part of the Jack Manning Trilogy Face To FaceA ConversationCharitable Intent which take as their format community conferencinga new form of restorative justice which Williamson became interested in the late s and early s.

When Glen, a young construction worker, rams into the back of his boss's Mercedes in a fit of anger at being sacked, he is given the opportunity to discuss his actions in a community conference, rather than going straight to court.

Community Face: The Play - an alternative method of justice recently [when? Cares for her son, and appears to be a little passive, nearly all of the characters appear to have some respect for her and she is discovered to have had an affair with Glen's boss Greg.
