Katherine is the educated, devout and dutiful daughter of King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella, joint rulers of Spain. She comes to England under

the terms of the contract arranged by their respective parents to marry the Prince of Wales. Successfully rebuffing a Scottish invasion, during her time as Regent, was arguably her finest the True Queen. Weir shows us how Henry sought her counsel until the appointment of Wolsey who usurped her influence and then latterly, Cromwell and Cranmer.

Throughout the book, Weir drops people into the story whom we know will feature in the future. She tells us that Thomas Boleyn was a favourite and we discover that Henry had a relationship with his daughter, Mary. It would Katherine of Aragon been interesting to have witnessed the frustration he must have felt towards her; however Weir resists the temptation to stray from her remit.

The pathos surrounding each pregnancy and the the True Queen loss of all but one child is palpable. During her exile, she shows fortitude and determination to preserve her status, although ultimately she is powerless to prevent Henry from divorcing her.
