A variety of maps were made on commission as usual, not only for monographs and articles, but also for the Ishtar Gate exhibition at the Institute for the Study of the Ancient World, New York University. In particular, the seven Wall Maps -- which continue to be offered in digital format without charge for non-commercial purposes -- have been in high demand from instructors and students at both school and college levels worldwide, most notably in Australia, Denmark, Italy, United Kingdom and US.

To date, maps *The Romans: From Village to Empire* others for this purpose notably by Serge Lancel have all been kept unsatisfyingly small-scale by a print-only format, in grayscale moreover. After lengthy discussions, agreement was reached that Lindsay Holman and Benet Salway University College London should join Richard Talbert to co-edit the substantially revised edition of the *Atlas of Classical History*.

Contributors to the original edition are being invited to review the fresh drafts of their maps; at the same time new contributors have been recruited, in most instances for plans of cities that could not be accommodated previously. So much mapmaking has provided exceptional opportunities for student assistants to gain training and experience.
